Montreal was Magnifique!



The Far Western District was very well represented at the Society International convention in Montreal. It was truly an international convention in a great city and 10,000 of our brethren weren't disappointed.

By now I'm sure everyone knows of the stellar performances of **Gotcha!**

and **Metropolis**, who garnered second and third place medals, respectively. What a thrill it was to go into the final set knowing two of our quartets were in the running for the gold. Two out of the top three ain't bad. They were certainly on their game!

One of the biggest ovations of the convention was when **Freestyle** was announced as finalist mictesters—which meant the audience would get to hear (and see) them one more time. Of course they didn't disappoint. They even enlisted the help of past champs **Fred** and **Four Voices** in their zany last set, which had the audience howling.

All of our quartets did us proud. Finale (13th); Late Night Barbershop (26th); Q (28th); Sam's Club (37th); and Broadway (38th) were great. Everyone was heartbroken when Hi Fidelity had to scratch at the last minute due to Tom Moore's illness—they made a valiant effort and were back stage all made up to do their *Munsters* routine, but it just wasn't to be.

Our college quartet, **Four Score**, did extremely well in a competition where the bar keeps moving up every year. These young men started out as one of our high school quartet competitors from San Diego a couple years ago and have stuck together as they've moved on into college. It's been a joy to watch their progress.

The **San Jose Garden City Chorus** enjoyed their first appearance at international. I'm sure they'd like to have scored a little better, but I'm also sure it was quite an enriching experience just to be there with the best in the world at what we do. Those of us in the **Masters of Harmony** didn't get to cheer for them on stage—we could only cheer them onto their bus—as we had to go into preparations for the swan song set.

The performances of our outgoing international chorus champions, the **Masters of Harmony**, were truly unforgettable. First there was the World Harmony Jamboree, where the chorus per

formed the "Dixie" set including last year's contest numbers—augmented by **Michigan Jake** during *Here Comes The Showboat*, and by renown trumpeter **Roger Blackburn** during *Dixie*. Then the **MOH** were joined on the risers by the 150 women of the Sweet Adeline champion **North Metro Chorus** from Toronto, and the two reigning champion barbershop choruses performed a stunning arrangement of *Before The Parade Passes By*—with choreography learned in less than half an hour at the only joint rehearsal the day before.

The **MOH** swan song set at the end of the chorus contest was one of the most challenging and exciting performances ever on the international stage. It concluded with *Stars & Stripes Forever*, with all the words, and flags flying, and wound up in a thunderous standing ovation that just wouldn't quit. And as if that wasn't enough, the **MOH** and the newly-crowned, 10-time interna-

tional champion **Vocal Majority** from Dallas joined forces for a "Midnight Madness" show where the two champion choruses performed jointly for the first time. When those 230-plus voices joined on *Let There Be Peace On Earth* and a medley of *God Bless America/America The Beautiful*, I'm sure the overtones (and undertones) could have set off earthquake alarms in California.

Those who stayed at home and followed the convention via the webcast got to appreciate the fine work once again by our own **Phil DeBar**.

Yes, the FWD presented its championship best on the world stage in Montreal, and you can be proud of all who participated.

Changes, Changes, Changes

Not all the action in Montreal was on the stage. As a result of actions by the Society Board, and all the other meetings that go on at conventions—and as a result of some independent action by your District Board—there are some significant changes in how we will be conducting our barbershop affairs.

 The Society Board approved a change in the Standard District Bylaws which provides districts with latitude in structuring their boards, thereby basically making legal the Far Western District structure for 2004 already approved by our HOD.

This and other changes are reflected in a revised Standard Operating Procedures (SOP) which is posted on the District web site, and which must be acted on by the House of Delegates in October. Highlights are included in the HOD brochure sent to all chapter delegates for review. This clears the way for the election of the new Board, including Division Vice Presidents. I ask that all chapter delegates study this material and come to Bakersfield prepared to deal with these important issues.

- There are significant changes coming also to the Society Board, and a new planning system whereby districts develop their own work plans-all for the purpose of better responding to individual chapter needs-but more about that later. There are changes in the C & J rules and the Collegiate Quartet Contest which Dick Girvin and Ed Bejarana will explain elsewhere.
- The 2009 International convention has been awarded to **Anaheim:** the 2006 Midwinter will return to **Sacramento**. So the FWD will host two more Society conventions.
- Speaking of conventions, there will be a proposal before the HOD in Bakersfield to switch the 2005 Spring prelims from Reno to Burbank, in exchange for awarding the 2007 Spring prelims to Reno. This will break up the four-year deal with Reno with a SoCal site—remember henceforth the Spring prelims are combined with the host division contest-and keep our convention on its traditional third week-end in March. (See Sam Barger's column for preliminary details. At this writing Sam was waiting for the results of **Doug Maddox's** site inspection.)
- A motion to re-align the Southern California divisions, to achieve a more equitable balance between the two, will also be before the HOD. This will be the first significant realignment of our divisions since they were created almost 30 years ago.

Other ideas floating around with your District leadership involve a change in our plateau award system, and a plan to create a new Chapter of the Year award, based on membership growth and outreach criteria. Peter Feeney and Lloyd Steinkamp, respectively, are working on those issues. An interesting suggestion that came out of the District Presidents' Forum at Montreal was that it might be time to create a special organization just for our female directors. Any ideas you might have along these lines, feed them to our VP CDD, Jim Turnmire.

Another area where there are major changes coming has to do with Harmony Foundation. There will be a significant refocusing of our charitable mission, geared to enlisting the world in our cause, and I can hardly wait to share this excitement with you as things develop. This is something extremely important to our future, and I will look forward to your support.

All in all, it's an exciting time. A new structure, a new slate, new ways of doing things. Do you think COTS will be important this fall? Whew! And to help put it all in perspective will be our special guest and keynote speaker at the Bakersfield convention, Society Treasurer Bob Guiggey. Bob was on one of our COTS faculties recently and those who were there know he's an enthusiastic and knowledgeable guy. Please join me in welcoming him to the FWD in October. I know he'd like to hear from as many of you as possible.

Chairman: Get Our Conventions Singing Again Task Force

Bakersfield is the Far Western District's place to be this October with so many singing choices and so few days. Besides the singing in the lobby, stairwells, elevators, and broom closets, there are classes, a Joe Barbershopper chorus for mic testing, buffet dinners with singing encouraged, and, oh yes, the contests too. If you like to sing with old friends and new ones too, don't miss this event.

The convening starts at 11:30 Friday at Pizzaville USA, 700 Oak Street, Bakersfield. Then at 2pm you can go to Dan McQuigg's class on Tag Singing and continue on with Dr. Val Hicks' New Music Sing-through class, or at 2pm you can go to Steve **Shannon's** class on *How to build the chapter you really want*, or as a delegate you can attend HOD. Immediately after all that, the hotel has a full buffet planned for around \$12 each and it's another place to sing. And that leads right into the quartet semi-finals and then the AFWDC show.

Saturday gets an early start with the Manly Art of Woodshedding by Steve Shannon, or you can join the Mic Tester chorus. Chorus contest follows, then the Mass Sing on the front steps with Jim Turnmire up front, another (and different) buffet, the quartet finals, the Show of Champions, and many options afterwards. We have hospitality rooms, a Gnarly Tag Sing with Jim Crowley, another New Music Sing-through, and of course the never ending quartetting going on everywhere.

If you want to get into a quartet, go to the registration area and visit the *Quartet Sign-up Table*. We'll do our best to match you with three others that are all within back-at-home driving distance of each other. Jump start your new quartet at the convention and rev it up when you get home.

Throughout the weekend a number of the competing quartets will be wandering and asking you to sing with them. You'll see some AHSOW quartets out too and they'll be inviting you to sing and woodshed with them.

When you read this you will only have a few days left to register at the early bird price. The new criteria has yet to be fine tuned, but directors who have attended previously would be eligible to apply. However, those who have never attended would still receive priority.


It's not too early to begin planning on attending Directors' College next summer. There will be several scholarships offered again, and I'm hoping that we are able to use ALL of them.

SELECT, ELECT AND TRAIN

By the time you read this your chapter article, should be close announcing the slate of officers for 2004. Society guidelines were followed, the process begun much earlier in the year, when your present board decided on the make up of next year's board and advised the nominating committee of

their decision. The Society mandates that five board members be appointed – president, secretary, treasurer, VP Chapter Development and VP Music & Performance – but offers no rules with regard to additional officers. It is up to each chapter to decide on the number of additional board members, including members at large, and their official titles. If new titles are being created, the chapter would do well to write out proper job descriptions.

Of course, certain titles are common. Most chapters select a program VP (even though, sadly, the Society does not mandate this position) and many will select a marketing and/or public relations VP. But there are others to consider, too. How about a VP for YMIH, a VP for chapter communications, a VP for operations, a VP for fundraising or perhaps an executive VP.

Towards the end of the Summer, the nominating committee should be meeting and discussing their selections. They would do well to talk to the current president and other officers, to get input regarding likely candidates and there's nothing wrong with having at least the current president attend their meetings ex-officio. The nominating committee's job should be taken very seriously. All too often officers are chosen because they've been around long enough or because they've never done that job before. Is that really the best way to make such important decisions? It certainly wouldn't work in a commercial environment. And I know we're just a hobby, but we want to succeed in our hobby and make our members happy, just like the officers of a corporation need to keep their shareholders happy.

So, who should the nominating committee choose? Does it need to be someone who's been a member of the Society for many years, or could a fairly new member do the job? (The most productive real estate company in the country was at one time made up of mostly new agents. Why did they do so well? Because they didn't know any of the old bad habits. They were told "this is how you get business" and just did it that way). Don't be afraid of how long a prospective board member has been a barbershopper. New blood often means new ideas, including maybe

some risky ones, but that could be just what your chapter needs. It would be more important to consider each prospect's commitment to the chapter and to the hobby, his availability, displayed initiative, leadership skills and public personality. And how about those members at large? That's for sure a great way to start a newer member on the path to leadership.

Ok, now we've selected the slate and we're ready for an election. This should take place by the end of September. My deadline for early bird registration at COTS is October 15th and your board should have been chosen well in advance of that. And that brings me to the final portion of my headline - "Select, Elect and TRAIN". We had a great turnout for COTS last year, even though many of the attendees felt they would learn nothing new. Wrong. Over and over again I heard that countless new ideas were discussed by excellent faculty members. Plus, the weekend is a great energy boosting, thought generating, bonding time with barbershop brothers. It is truly not to be missed. And there's no excuse this year. We're at the classiest of hotels (a Hilton), just off the 405 freeway, a few hundred yards from LAX and close to enough world famous tourist sights that officers should be bringing their entire families, especially with a specially negotiated \$79 per night room rate for additional days. How about every chapter sends every officer? Isn't that the way it should be? Right. So get those registrations in to me ASAP.

Thanks for listening, Gentlemen. We'll see you all in Bakersfield next month. It's going to be the best District Convention ever.



TWO IMPORTANT ITEMS FOR BAKERSFIELD

There are 2 subjects that are very important to all members attending the FWD Fall convention in Bakersfield (October 2-5 2003). The 1st will require a vote by the chapter delegate at the House of Delegate's meeting. The 2nd is a point that (hopefully) can speed up the eating process and

alleviate the "rush" for dinner before the evening contests.

Subject 1: Two years ago (at the HOD meeting) a bid was presented by the Reno Chapter to hold the FWD Spring International Preliminary Contest in Reno/Sparks for the years 2004, 2005 and 2006. The 2003 Spring contest had already been awarded to Reno at a previous HOD meeting. Since, at that time there were no opposing bids from other areas, all of the bids for the designated conventions were awarded to the Reno chapter. Our goal is to propose different sites for conventions so that travel is evened out between North and South members.

At this time we have a good bid from the Burbank Hilton and Convention Center to hold the 2005 FWD Spring Convention in Burbank. An arrangement has been worked out with the Reno Chapter and the Nugget Hotel Convention Center (contest site) to swap the 2005 convention (to Burbank) for the 2007 Spring convention (to Reno). Consequently, we will be able to change the venue for that year and will split up the travel between the North and South. The 2005 FWD Fall convention has already been awarded to Pasadena.

Since the HOD voted to award the bid for Spring 2005 to Reno the HOD has to approve the move to Burbank for this year. It also must approve the Reno bid to be accepted for 2007. Your chapter needs to be represented for this vital vote – be there to fulfill the count!!

Subject 2: Everyone who has attended the Fall conventions in Bakersfield over the last few years realizes what a problem it has been to get something to eat prior to the evening contests. The headquarters hotel has a nice restaurant but it is not large enough to accommodate our large group in a short period of time. The line at the restaurant has always been long.

We have made arrangements with the hotel to provide a great buffet in the ballroom and the restaurant. What we need to know is how many would support this effort? We could do this both Friday and Saturday if we have good enough numbers. I'm hoping for AT LEAST 300. Tickets would be sold in the registration area starting Friday. The cost would be \$12.50. 



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FWD Invades Missouri Campus

Sweet Memories (Jim DeChaine-tenor, Val Pizzini-lead, Valney Simpson-bari, Terry Johnson-bass) from the Santa Rosa Chapter did a fun rendition of "Cool, Clear Water."

Have you made your plans to attend this year's fall convention? If you have not done so, please don't delay. For more information about the many events that will be taking place in Bakersfield during the first weekend in October you can visit the convention website at

Let's take a look at some of the activities planned for the convention. If you arrive on Friday morning you are just in time for the Harmony For Lunch Bunch. Starting right after lunch at 2 pm you can attend the House of Delegates meeting, or go the Tag Singing Class or the New Music Sing-Through Class, which starts right after the Tag Singing ends. Perhaps you'd like to visit the AHSOW room.

A buffet dinner will be served starting at 4 pm right at the hotel, which should be very convenient for everybody. At 6 pm the doors open for the quartet contest...and what a competitive contest it promises to be. The judges have to cut the very large field of 26 down to 10 for the finals on Saturday night. I don't envy them their job. By the way, joining the contest on Friday night will be a quartet from our brothers in our 50th state, Hawaii. They are the **Tropichords** and will sing first, so don't be late!

The day isn't over yet, however. Right after the contest get ready for the AFWDC Show, or join in some impromptu singing, and there is still time to visit with AHSOW. O.k., you can go to bed now, unless you want to join the group singing some tags in the lobby.

In the Heart of the Golden State

Bakersfield was named in 1869 after Col. Thomas Baker who had planted a 10-acre field of alfalfa. Travelers frequently stopped there to rest and refresh themselves and their animals on their journey. What an apt description of our convention; it may be better for most of us to leave the animals at home, however.

The chorus contest starts off Saturday with a mic tester chorus taking the stage at 10:45 am. Look for your opportunity to get in on the fun starting at the mic tester rehearsal at 9:45 am. The chorus contest should be a barnburner. There are 26 choruses in the contest this year! The **Westminster** chapter returns to compete this year after their excellent showing at last year's conven-

tion and Pacific Coast Harmony from La Jolla, CA competes for the first time. Sounds of Aloha from Hawaii will sing in the third position, and our current champions, the Garden City Chorus will sing last. Each chorus in the competition has its own story. For example, Ken Potter takes over from Mike McGee as director of the Rincon Beach Pacific Sound, and the St. George Color Country Chorus makes its second trip in as many years to the competition from Utah. This is a competition not to be missed.

There'll be a hot time in the old town tonight!

But first, let's eat! The buffet is served again at 4 pm, how convenient is that? There is a large mass sing planned for the steps of the convention center at 4:30 pm. Good stuff! On to the quartet finals. The doors open at 6 pm. Who will take the crown? TO: DISTRICT HOUSE OF DELEGATES consisting of chapter presidents or alternates, elected district officers and past district presidents who are living in the Far Western District and are currently paid up members, in good standing, of a Far Western Chapter.

WHERE, WHEN: Friday, October 3, 2003 Holiday Inn, Bakersfield, California.

ELIGIBILITY: One delegate or alternate from each chapter; elected district officers; and past district presidents who are living in the FWD and who are paid-up members of a FWD Chapter in good standing. Non-voting members of the HOD is one delegate from chapters on licensed status or newly formed groups on the date of the meeting, district coaches, and committee chairmen.

QUORUM: Thirty percent (30%) of the eligible House of Delegate members, (no proxies).

REGISTRATION: Chapter delegates are required to bring with them, to the meeting, the credentials card which accompanies the HOD report and to present this card to the appropriate credentials officer upon arrival at the meeting.

AGENDA: As set forth in the Far Western District Constitution and Bylaws. Agenda items must have the proposal ratified by a majority vote in the originating chapter. Such items should be submitted by the chapter delegate to the district secretary's office not less than sixty (60) days prior to the next meeting of the House of Delegates.

RECOGNITION: Only members of the House of Delegates will be recognized for floor privileges.

VISITORS: Visitors are cordially invited to attend but are requested to refrain from taking seats at the official tables.

Laying it on the line

On July 5th 80 members of the Garden City Chorus simultaneously expended nine months of concentrated effort, and in less than six minutes it was over. At the final tally the chorus was announced as having finished in the 18th position with scores averaging 79.0. What did it feel like? More important, how do the chapter members feel about their performance?

The privilege of representing the Far Western District on the International stage is something that no barbershopper could ever take lightly. Considering the fact that out of over 870 chapters in the Society comprised of 33,000 members only 20 Society choruses and one affiliate had earned the right to compete and it was obvious that we were in very select company. Joining the ranks of previous FWD chorus champions from Eden-Hayward, San Diego, Marin, Berkeley, Downey, Riverside, Phoenix, Peninsula, Fresno, San Fernando Valley, Foothill Cities and Bay Area Metro, each member of the San Jose Garden City Chorus came to appreciate the enormous amount of dedication and sacrifice that had gone into preparing to represent the FWD in each of the previous 51 International contests.

Friday evening the chorus had a celebratory dinner, during which we marked several firsts for San Jose. In addition to this being the first opportunity for the chorus to compete on the International stage it also marked the first time in chapter history that we were represented by two quartets; Alan Gordon, who has been competing with GOTCHA! for a number of years was joined by Matt McKee in Late Night Barbershop. For five new members it was the first time in any chorus competition. And, sadly, it marked the last performance for one member who is leaving the San Jose area. The evening's fellowship was capped off by remarks delivered by FWD President John Krizek, Chapter President Randy Meyer, Musical Director Chris Hebert, and Chapter Board Member Chuck Hunter Sr., who spoke about tapping into unused potential.

Saturday morning began with a chapter breakfast, following which make-up was applied and the chorus prepared for the stage. San Jose was fortunate to share a rehearsal space and risers with the Southern Gateway Chorus, and members of each group had an opportunity to visit and wish the others well before the pre-contest chorus flow began. A visit by Cindy Hanson reminded each chorus member of his responsibility in delivering the package on stage.

When the curtain opened on the vast audience it was a thrill sensing that we were not just receiving polite applause as an unheralded chorus, but rather there was both enthusiasm and inspiration coming at us from audience members representing the entire barbershop family. From the opening pitch through the final tag this sense of bonding with the audience strengthened in spite of the cavernous arena into which we sang, and the fulfillment of this wonderful performance opportunity was over much too soon.

After leaving the stage the chorus gathered for a few moment and director Chris Hebert thanked each man for delivering his best effort. Following hugs and handshakes the members of the choruses seated themselves in the arena and proceeded to be dazzled by the chorus performances that followed.

Not a single member of the chorus had any pretensions of a medal, yet truthfully there were more than a few who were initially taken aback by the placement in 18th position. However upon careful reflection on our scores, averaging 79, consensus was reached that with a sprinkling of 80's in all three categories that our A-level performance was as good as we were able to give . . . at this point in our chapter's development! In the past ten years the San Jose Garden City Chorus has ranked in the top three at the Fall Contest six times, and it is our intent to continue to improve our scores and entertainment value each time we appear in the future.

Bakersfield, here we come!

With the addition of the Aloha Chorus, that may compete anytime without pre-qualification, the total number of choruses that

will trod the boards in Bakersfield goes to 26! The current "Target Score" of 59% (of the total possible points) in the division contests brought a wide distribution of choruses from the district: SCW - 4, SCE - 8, NCE - 5, NCW - 3, ASNSU - 4, Small Chapter Chorus Contest -2.

Mathematically minded folk will immediately agree that the sum is 26. But there is more. With sincere regrets we accepted the withdrawal of two chapters who qualified, however, decided not to compete this Fall, and, was pleased to accept the entry of the Aloha Chapter who "gets to the mainland" every decade or so. Of course, our 2003 International Representative is automatically seeded to the event—bringing the total to 26. This while providing a great opportunity for these contestants, it does present a problem. Society Rules require that more than 25 contestants will necessitate a second session. The Rules also point out that there can be an exception to the rules - which has been requested and approved.

An equal number of quartets have qualified for the Fall Contest. Using the "target score" of 64% for Regular Quartets, 60% for Seniors, plus the top 5 Seniors (who have never been FWD Senior Champ before) the divisional contests provided the following: SCW - 5, SCE - 5, NCE - 5, NCW - 61, ASNSU - 5.

The same mathematician that added the top column reports that this, too, totals 26. But, as it sometimes happens, there are those who withdraw for one reason or another. This year we had two such withdrawals. However, from across the blue Pacific, we had two entries from Aloha (permitted by SOP without prequalifying) which bring the total back to 26. The same problem exists regarding the second session but it is hoped that the triple panel assigned will agree to "just one more...." being added.

This "problem," is annually reviewed by the FWD BOD and each year they approve target scores that will bring as many contestants as possible to the Fall event without requiring the second session and the additional cost, effort (and approval) necessary. As a result, a proposal to raise these target scores slightly (1%)

to alleviate the near overload is anticipated at the Fall Board

When the curtain came down on the College Quartet Competition in Montreal the Far Western District was the proud father of a top ten finalist.

If the dedication and attitude demonstrated by Four Score is a sample of the health of the College program then we are sure to see many more Gold Medals coming from this segment of the Society in the future.

The inimitable DANNY KAYE said, "Life is a great big canvass; throw all the paint on it you can". Barbershoppers who miss out on the quartet experience probably do so for many different reasons. Observe perennial chorus bass singer Wayne Brozovich of Tampa Bay, Florida, a man who has held multiple offices in our organization. Chapter and district president and international board member, Wayne after twenty-seven years as a member of the society sang in his first-ever quartet contest in the first weekend of May in the Sunshine District and, with a little help from three other guys, in a quartet called Fourth Quarter won the senior's contest. Ask Wayne if previous barbershop experiences came even close to the quartet experience. Ask his quartet partners, Dave Roberts, Kent Jenkins and Bob Lang if they had any fun. Put yourself in the shoes of college and high school quartets, competing for the honor of representing their district at the International College Quartet Contest at Montreal this summer. Singing with obvious joy and enthusiasm, they receive standing ovations and, with their quickly acquired and very high level of skills, left little doubt as to the future of our hobby. Backstage, they mingled easily with administrators, senior's quartets, and mainstream competitors and with old timers like me. Their pleasure in making great music for an appreciative audience was obvious. We all love their amazing capacity for achievement in our style, but we need not be intimidated. Each of us can enjoy our hobby at some level. The greatest fun in our hobby comes from the process of learning to sing together with three other guys with similar capacities and goals.

In a career spanning some fifty three years, I have participated at the highest levels in our hobby, but some of my very best moments have occurred when I got to sing an "old chestnut" with three other guys at an afterglow or when I coached a quartet of old timers who simply loved to sing and, even more, loved being brought together by the shared quartet experience. Don't fail to investigate your potential for singing in a quartet.

MONTREAL--A GREAT CON-VENTION CITY

Society Board Sets Record



The Sixty-fifth International Convention was held in Montreal, Quebec, Canada and what a great convention it was. One could not have asked for more exciting contests. Power Play from the Pioneer District was a popular winner of the quartet contest, but Gotcha! and Metropolis were nipping at their heels as well

as at one another's, while placing second and third. And **Freestyle** set a level for comedy that will be hard to beat. They were Mic Testers for the quartet finals for the second year in a row, only this year they did it by placing eleventh.

There is always a memorable contest set for me at these conventions, This year it was the performance of the Greendale, WI **Midwest Vocal Express Chorus** who placed fifth. They were dressed as plastic toy soldiers who came to life when their little boy owner left the room a la the movie "*Toy Story*." They sang great, acted out their parts very well, and had some cute gimmicks including a melting soldier leaving behind only his combat boots. Very clever stuff!

Of course there were the usual meetings that are part of these conventions. Following two days of meetings by subgroups of the Society Board, the Board met on Tuesday for four and a half hours-- one of the longest running meetings in the history of the Society. There were a large number of issues handled, and I will describe those that are most important to the district and you the members.

A report was received from the Governance and Management Task Force (GMTF) which was established at the Midwinter Convention in January of this year. Among their initial recommendations adopted by the Board, districts will be allowed to create separate and distinct structures for governance and leadership (the district board) and management operations (the district operations team). Under these provisions the FWD will be able to implement the organizational structure it approved at the Spring HOD meeting.

Also, by 2005, each district will change from its current district organizational structure and shall have an appointed operations team whose responsibility will be to deliver services and resources to chapters. The operations team will also be responsible for completing the district's goals that contribute to the Society Board's strategic guidance.

Recommendation for changes in chapter management structure are to be provided by the GMTF for Board action at the next Board meeting to be held in November.

The current method of electing Society Board Members from paired districts will also be changing. I am currently serving my third year and last year as SBM for the Evergreen and Far Western Districts. Under the current rules, the Evergreen District would elect a SBM for a three year term beginning in 2004. The EVG/FWD election under the new system will probably take place in 2005. Under these new rules nominations will be made by the nominating committees of the EVG and FWD districts, as well as at-large nominees from the two districts by the Society Nominating Committee. The three nominating committees will then discuss the nominees and select a minimum of two names to be forwarded to the Society Board who will elect the SBM. This same operation will be taking place among all the paired sixteen districts. A district will not be guaranteed to have one of its members elected to a SBM position every three years as now occurs. It is important to remember that the SBMs are not elected to represent their district, but to vote according to what they feel is best for the Society as a whole.

The Board also voted to create a Hall of Fame Committee whose task will be to select past or present members for nomination to a Society Hall of Fame. There are probably hundreds of barbershoppers who deserve to be considered for nomination for this honor starting with **O. C. Cash** and **Rupert Hall**.

The Society Contest and judging committee asked for a modification of the contest and judging rules as follows: "...brief comments made with supporting visual communications may be permitted to more clearly establish mood/theme, assist the transition of packaged songs, or to add to the effect of closure of mood/theme. Spoken words deemed to be excessive or detrimental to the performance shall be penalized by the presentation judge(s) up to and including forfeiture." This modification was approved by the Board and is effective with the fall 2003 contest cycle. It will be interesting to see what transpires on the contest stage with this rule modification.

Changes to the Official Rules of the MBNA America Collegiate Barbershop Quartet Contest (CBQC) were approved by the Board. The main change will allow members of the Society between the ages of 17 and 25 to sing in the CBQC. Previously no more than two members of a competing quartet could be Society members. Also, members of these quartets will not have to be enrolled in an educational institution in order to compete. The complete rules can be found on the Society Website if you wish to view them.

Approval was also given to a recommendation by the Society Membership Development Committee to provide dropped members an opportunity to reinstate as Frank Thorne International members by enrollment in the Easy Dues Program with no district dues being charged. Deadline for this offer will be December 31, 2003.

The complete minutes of the meeting have been posted to the Society Website. There are many topics, which I have not referred to, including the sites selected for future Midwinter and International Conventions.

Now you have some idea why the meeting lasted so long. None of these actions were cut and dried or rubber stamped. There is a lot of give and take that goes on in the subgroup meetings as well as during the actual Board meeting. It is a real honor for me to be representing the FWD on the Society Board of Directors, serving with a group of dedicated barbershoppers,


