The first performances for the **Masters of Harmony** after winning their first gold medal in San Francisco in 1990 and their ninth in Las Vegas in 2017 were for faithbased audiences. In 1990, the Masters performed a show titled "It's a Grand Night for Singing" for the Sisters of St. Joseph of Orange. In 2017, the Masters provided the entertainment for a unique program called "Music and Meals" at St. Andrews Presbyterian Church in Newport Beach. After attending a lateafternoon Saturday service, congregants mingled in an outdoor patio outside the sanctuary, selected from a variety of delicious dishes served cafeteria style, then joined their friends at one of the circular tables to enjoy first-class food and world-class music by the newly crowned International chorus champions. With the sun shining in chorus members' eyes, Director Justin Miller allowed those who wished to wear sunglasses, adding even more of a laid-back look to the alreadyrelaxed appearance of singers in their Class B jeans and chorus shirts. Fortunately, the sun went down just before the Masters sang the contest set that won them gold in Las Vegas five weeks earlier. The outdoor setting in a patio between two sets of buildings provided surprisingly good acoustics that allowed Justin to shape the chorus sound to great effect while amplifying the

long, loud audience applause that engulfed the chorus throughout the concert. St. Andrews Minister **Rachel Stone**, one of the event organizers, said the audience was the largest since the beginning of the program.

On October 7, the Masters took part in a unique fundraising event at Santa Anita Park in Arcadia by singing the National Anthem before the first race. The place from which they sang was, appropriately, the Winner's Circle, a world-famed site once graced by equine champions such as Seabiscuit, Swaps, Affirmed, Zenyatta, and California Chrome. After the performance, some stayed to enjoy the ambiance of a private picnic area.

Not long after the hurricane season left enormous devastation in parts of our country, Masters members had a "Pass-the-Hat" solicitation where they opened their hearts and wallets to the tune of over \$1200 to be sent to hurricane relief organizations.

On October 11, the following members were elected to the Masters of Harmony 2018 Board of Directors: President Jackson Niebrugge; Secretary Maurice Freleaux; Treasurer Skip Farrar; VP-Chapter Development Cody Littlefield; VP-Music & Performance Patrick Haedtler; VP-Operations Foster Howlett; VP-Public Relations Michael Van Schoonhoven; Board Members-at-Large Charles Carothers, Lucas Purcell, **Ed Schackman, Brent Schultz, Robert Shelton,** and **Walter Tang**. These newly elected chapter leaders will be installed at the Annual Awards and Installation of Officers Banquet set for Saturday, January 6, 2018, at the Yorba Linda Country Club.

On October 21, the Masters traveled to Bakersfield's Rabobank Convention Center to take part in the 2017 Far Western District Fall Convention. Performing as the outgoing 2016 Far Western District Chorus Champion



and current International Chorus Champion, the MOH reprised the contest set that won gold in Las Vegas. The hometown audience responded to the set with the same sort of sustained thunderous applause that greeted the Masters in Las Vegas ten weeks ago. Then the Masters introduced the audience to a powerful,

emotionally stirring paean to the power of faith and hope, "Simple Gifts," a Shaker song written and composed in 1847 by Elder Joseph Brackett. The musical DNA of the arrangement sung by the Masters in Bakersfield was pure gold. **Gary Lewis** (tenor of 2000 International Quartet Champion **Platinum** and baritone of 2007 International Quartet Champion **Max Q**) arranged the song for the 2017 AIC Champions Chorus, which performed it at the 2017 Las Vegas AIC Show. While the full chorus sang much of the song, **The Newfangled Four** and an out-front VLQ sang several sections that added dramatic effect and produced another standing ovation from the appreciative audience.

Congratulations to our brothers in **The Westminster Chorus**, winners of the chorus competition with a score of 92.9% and to **Suit Up!**, who captured the Far Western District quartet title.

2017 Youth Harmony Camp

Harmony Camp 2017 is a memory now. But what a memory!!

Harmony Camp 2017 had just about everything you could want. 92 boys came to Camp. Instant Classic and The Newfangled Four showed exactly what truly great quartets are all about. Our four clinicians, Gabe Caretto, Ron Black, Doug Carnes and Chris Lewis were simply stellar in their teaching, directing and mentoring the boys.

The show on Sunday morning was spectacular; but I'm getting ahead of myself.

We usually have one clinician turn over each year as our "fourth" clinician. That was originally going to be Theo Hicks, lead of Instant Classic. However he was just accepted into a master's program and had a mandatory performance the weekend of camp. Well, Jackson Niebrugge, lead of The Newfangled Four stepped into the Instant Classic lead role.

That still left me with the "fourth" clinician vacancy. So I called my "go to" guy, Dr. Chris Peterson, professor of music at Cal State Fullerton. Chris immediately said that he himself could not take on the task, but that he would highly recommend Doug Carnes, the new director of Great Northern Union Chorus out of Minneapolis. My email to Doug was returned quickly with a resounding YES, I'm happy to join your Camp as a clinician.

Then long time clinician Jim Halvorson called and let me know that he has taken on a high office in the Nevada ACDA and simply could not afford the time commitment for Harmony Camp this year.

We looked around northern California at all the regional directors and Fog City literally jumped out as the place to check out. Chris Lewis, the Director of Fog City had previously been to camp as the bass of Brannigan and was thrilled and excited to be asked to serve as our fourth clinician.

Ok, we're finally set. Now we can focus on attracting boys to come to Camp.

With our continuing emphasis on contacting choral directors and previous campers we ended up with an astounding 92 boys almost equaling the highest number we've ever had. And what quality!!! The sound quality and their attentiveness and ability to learn the songs quickly were clearly the best ever!

Equally exciting was the fact that we welcomed boys

from 7 high schools that had not previously participated in Harmony Camp. Furthermore, of the 43 members of our entire staff, 7 were young men who were alumni of Harmony Camp

A little about our activities at camp. Most of the boys come to camp with at least some familiarity with the four songs we learn. As the boys register we forward them the link to the charts and learning tracks and suggest they spend some time becoming familiar with the songs. By the way, our volunteers also learn the songs. We have five general sessions where the boys work on the songs, one song with each of the clinicians.

On Saturday the boys participate in classes on the Fundamentals of Vocal Production, How to Harmonize Using Tags and Bow Tie (singing posture). Following our early afternoon general session we provide optional afternoon classes including quartet coaching, woodshedding, MC basics (one of the boys in this class was the MC for our Sunday morning show) and how to be a great Bass, Lead, Tenor and Baritone.

A highlight of the weekend is the Saturday night Talent Show. It is amazing to see what the boys put together for this show. And yes, every night we enjoy ice cream in the cafeteria. The boys can then go sing tags with staff until midnight. It's a Full couple of Days

We do not assign cabins thereby encouraging new friendships; it works. Individuals arrive at camp, friends leave.

A highlight of Saturday morning is "Getting to Know Instant Classic". The quartet talks of the journey to their Gold Medal, and there are lots of questions from the boys.

All meals are in the cafeteria, with the boys, volunteers, music staff and visiting quartets eating together. The discussions I have heard here are priceless and not always about music. What a wonderful way to get to know others and mix generations.

Saturday afternoon a couple of the clinicians and I meet with the music educators who have joined us for the weekend. This is an interactive meeting that we will be expanding next year at the suggestion of the music educators.

A highlight for me this year was having seven former high school campers join us as volunteers. We are indeed developing leaders and responsible young men in our society and in the barbershop world. As one boy told me last year, spending the weekend with others who enjoy singing as much as I do is a dream.

Back to some of our marketing efforts. In addition to reaching out to music educators, this year we began reaching out to community organizations (Boys and Girls Clubs, Teen Centers, YMCA, Big Brothers) who may come in contact with boys whose schools do not have choral programs or those boys who may not participate in their school choral program. We believe this is one way to expand our outreach and we invite you to participate with us in this endeavor.

We also began contacting community businesses, telling them about Harmony Camp and asking for their financial or in-kind support. We actually received some in-kind support from Raley's this year and used it to purchase most of our bottled water for the boys.

We also received a grant from the Dennis Mangers Fund for Young Performing Artists of the Sacramento Region Community Foundation to provide scholarships for boys in Sacramento, Yolo, Placer and El Dorado Counties. This grant enabled us to substantially increase our scholarship offerings this year.

At the end of camp we ask the boys to complete an evaluation of camp which we use in planning camp the following years. One boy, a first time attendee, came up to me and offered to design a Harmony Camp Facebook page. I will be working with him to get this up and running.

Getting back to my earlier sentence, the show on Sunday was beyond spectacular. To have more than a hundred men on the risers singing the four Camp songs incredibly well; and Instant Classic and Newfangled Four as our headliner quartets, you just couldn't ask for a better lineup for a show. And the show wow'd our audience of Friends and Family. I think the folks were simply awestruck with the quality of the performance and that hundred man sound.

In past years following the Show, we have always had parents ask more about how camp started, etc. This year, our "first ever" show program was designed to give some history of Harmony Camp since the first year in 1996 at Camp Wrightwood in San Bernardino. In addition, Jo Black prepared a display board of Harmony Camp Through The Years which was a popular attraction.

We get many comments from parents and boys, and I want to share a couple with you. In my brief introduc-

tion of camp before the Show I commented that you (the audience) are seeing a number of "older" men on the risers along with the boys; and I explained that we consider the intergenerational mixing of our older volunteers singing on the risers with the boys to be a very important aspect of camp. Well, after the show I had one lady come up to me with tears in her eyes thanking me for recognizing and integrating the intergenerational mixing of the older men with the boys. It was one of "those moments".

Second, I include an email message I received from a parent "Please excuse the lateness of this note. I need to thank everyone who made Harmony Camp possible, and provided a scholarship for my son. He attended and was very challenged, but the experience renewed his desire to sing. As he put it, "Even though I was standing on risers till my feet hurt, I was singing my heart out. It made me realize that's what I really want to reach people with the music". It is so hard for young people to hold onto hope in this current world. Thank you for restoring my son's hope and giving him a vision for the future. We appreciate the opportunity and will not waste it! "

You, our wonderful supporters and volunteers deserve all of the credit for the incredible success of the Camp this year. Thank you!

Lloyd Steinkamp Endowment Fund for FWD Harmony Camps Double Match Challenge



The primary purpose of weekend long Harmony Camps is to introduce a cappella barbershop harmony singing to high school age boys. The Lloyd Steinkamp Endowment Fund for FWD Harmony Camps will provide supplemental financial support, in perpetuity, for FWD Harmony Camps.

Lloyd Steinkamp was a true giant in the Far Western District and it was Lloyd who created the concept of Harmony Camp. The first camp was in 1996 in Southern California at Camp Wrightwood near San Bernardino. It is my understanding that this was the first Harmony Camp not only in the FWD but in the nation.

Initially all funds donated to the Endowment Fund will be used to build the capital of the fund toward an initial goal of \$200,000. Once the Fund balance achieves this initial goal, withdrawals may commence consistent with the policies of the Sacramento Region Community Foundation. Currently these policies allow a withdrawal of no more than 4% per year. As the Fund continues to grow, the prime recipient of withdrawals from the Fund is the FWD Youth Harmony Camp in Northern California. The overall goal for the Fund is \$400,000, at which point the FWD Board will become the executors of the available withdrawals from the Fund and the purpose of the Fund will expand to incorporate the entire FWD Youth Movement. A major donor has stepped up to "double" match contributions of \$400 or less through November 2017. Sometimes we have a cause we believe in but feel that our small contribution will not make much of a difference. With this "double" match challenge your donation will really make a difference. For example you donation of \$100 will be matched with \$200 so that you are "causing" \$300 to be donated to the Fund.

Our choice to create an Endowment Fund with the Sacramento Region Community Foundation, a large Northern California Community Foundation means that all contributed funds are off limits for spending, and only earnings are available for spending to support operations of the camp. This old barbershopper will certainly be around for a few more years; but the goal is to provide financial support for Far Western District Camps for as long as there are young boys who benefit from them! Here's a New Money-Making Idea

In September, Rincon Beach...Pacific Sound Chorus... had a very successful show. The headliner was the newly-crowned International Quartet Champs, Main Street, and as most of you know, Mike McGee, bari of Main Street, is the new director of Pacific Sound Chorus. Compared to the 2016 show, which had Ringmasters as the headliner, this show was even more successful in several important categories. Artistically, as many of you who were there know, each year's show was fantastic entertainment. Total attendance this year was 1000 compared to 800 last year. Net revenue was \$7000 compared to \$1000.

What made the difference? Sponsorship/Advertising. For several years now, the chapter has created a yearbook each Sept. which is given out at all shows for a 12 month period. Like most chapters who do a yearbook or show program we solicit advertising. Last year we sold \$3,400 of "ads" and this year we sold \$12,000 of "sponsorships." We changed one word... instead of selling advertising we solicited "sponsors." This seems small but it was so much easier for our guys to ask friends, family and business connections to be "sponsors" of our non-profit community chorus, rather than asking them for an "ad."

But wait...there's more to this idea! Let me tell you about the "free tickets!"

Mike McGee brought back this idea when Main Street did a show in tiny Hays, Kansas. Hays has a population of 20,000 but last year made \$30,000 from their show program, and it was 44 pages long, and full of "sponsorships." Their idea, which we modified to fit our demographic, was to give away "free" tickets to every sponsor...lots of "free tickets." We basically gave each sponsor an equal value in tickets. Our tickets were \$25 each (and it says that on the printed ticket... very important) and for example, if they gave us a \$250 sponsorship, we gave them 10 tickets to the show. So now the sponsor is helping us by distributing the tickets to their employees, family and friends, and we found that although all the "free" ticketholders did not attend, we had many first-timers coming to our show and we captured their emails and will be in touch.

A couple of those newbies may be interested in singing, and, giving away free tickets did not significantly diminish the number of tickets we sold through normal channels.

I wrote a little paper on this idea and gave it to the SE and SW Division Leadership Academy attendees. If anyone out there would like the info, just email me brent@andersonfs.com and I'll send you the packet of info.

I'm sure every chapter can benefit from more people coming to shows and more net revenue, so try this idea and report back to Westunes how it goes.

An Abridged History of Nostalgia

The quartet Nostalgia was founded by lead Joe Salz and tenor Bill Adank in March, 1975. It was Joe's idea to use the name—to take advantage of the popular use of the word. Both Joe and Bill were members of the 1972 FWD Champion quartet, Stage Four. Other members of the original quartet were bass Gordon Bergthold and baritone Don Richardson (me).

The original foursome placed eighth at Internal Pre-Lims and at the FWD fall contest. This led to us proclaiming that we were "middlists" rather than medalists. Joe's philosophy was never to win as winning quartets broke up.

Early in the quartet history there were road trips. One notable trip was to San Jose in 1976 to help Elwood and Ginger Bergthold celebrate their 40th wedding anniversary. Another came in 1991 when we drove to Denver for my niece's wedding. Ask Dick Gray or Greg Lewis about the "trip from hell."

We were devastated when Joe announced in 1976 he was moving to Sacramento to manage a credit union there. However, we recruited Bob Kafer (formerly of

the Vigilaires) to sing baritone, and I switched to lead. One notable aspect of the quartet history was the Nostalgia Newsletter which all members were invited to contribute to, but which was written primarily by me. At first I sent it to show chairmen as listed in the FWD annual directory, hoping to generate bids for show appearance. I did 75 issues before I lost the impetus. In the early years of the quartet, we competed in every contest: international pre-lims, FWD fall contest, and division, usually coming in somewhere in the middle. We tried to challenge ourselves and reward our audiences by being creative. For example, we were the first quartet to present the Marx Brothers. After that we did the monsters (Frankenstein's monster, the mummy, Dracula, and the wolfman), and then Sesame Street. Once we were a family (I was the mother). I don't know whether this approach garnered any points from the judges, but the audience seemed to appreciate us.

Over time we were invited to sing on various chapter shows and, of course, made many new friends. These included barbershoppers and fans in Arizona, California, New Mexico, Nevada, Colorado, Texas, Montana, Missouri, Arkansas, New Hampshire, Wisconsin, and Nebraska. We even had to turn down a bid from the Dallas Metro Chapter as we were already booked for their weekend. We didn't sing in as many states as did the Sun Tones, but we enjoyed ourselves.

With the aid of Lloyd and Judy Steinkamp and Sam Aramian as coaches, we qualified for the 1978 International Quartet Contest. Predicting 25th before the contest, we came in 24th out of 48 (one quartet canceled). In Cincinnati we were privileged to sing the National Anthem at Riverfront Stadium for a baseball game.

The shows all run together now, but there were highlights, naturally. Las Vegas barbershoppers were our special friends as were those in Tucson and Scottsdale. Billings, San Jose, Houston, Durango, Fort Collins, Carson City, St. Joseph, Nashua, El Paso, San Diego, San Luis Obispo, Hot Springs, and Whittier all were highlights of our career. We met and enjoyed singing with Earl Moon, Jim Kline, and all the 139th Street Quartet, Bub Thomas, Dave Briner: you name the barbershoppers from the 70s and 80s, and we probably sang with them.

And the quartets: we were proud to share the stage with the 139th Street Quartet, R.S.V.P., the Inn-Siders, the Side Street Ramblers, the Most Happy Fellows, the Occidentals, and many, many local groups.

During the spring of 1979 we sang 17 out of 21 weekends; this was hard on our wives—we were all still married, but what fun we had. At the time I knew that such popularity was short-lived, so I and the others resolved to enjoy it while we could.

Twice in our history we've sung and acted as the school board members in The Music Man: 1986 with the Musical Theatre of Arizona, and in 2014 for North Scottsdale UMC.

Nostalgia continues today, but much of our focus now is on gospel songs. During the summer when most church choirs are on hiatus, we sign at various churches to substitute for the choir: First United Methodist in Phoenix (where we all sing in the choir), North Scottsdale UMC, Paradise Valley UMC, Velda Rose UMC in Mesa, and the Justa Center. We have also done churches in Sun City and another in Paradise Valley. The members of the quartet include nearly every barbershopper from the Phoenix area that you've heard of. 

The Super Senior Champ from the Spring Contests is Above The Lawn, and the Novice Champ is Scoop 'Em Up. Winner of the audience-selected Lloyd Steinkamp Most Entertaining Award is The Velvet Frogs.

Our District Champion Chorus and representative to the 2018 International Chorus Contest in Orlando in July is our **Westminster Chorus**, with an average score of 92.9, with which they are seeded as a 2nd place (bested by Dallas Metro, The Vocal Majority). Joining them as a wildcard invitation to the 2018 International is Barbary Coast **Fog City Singers**.

Sun Harbor is the Far Western District Most Improved Chorus.

The 2018 Spring Conventions are (watch Westunes and the FWD website for more information):

International Quartet Prelims plus SW/SE Quartet and Chorus Divisions is March 16-18 in Southern California, venue to be announced soon. **Deadline for contest entry is February 16**.

The Arizona Quartet and Chorus Division is April 14, again in Mesa AZ. **Deadline for contest entry is March 17**.

The NW/NE Quartet and Chorus Divisions is April 14, location in is Lodi, Hutchins Conference Center. **Deadline for contest entry is March 17.**



As I have written before, The BHS Midwinter Convention is coming to the FWD. It will be held in 2018 at the beautiful Segerstrom Hall in Costa Mesa, California from Tuesday Jan. 16 thru Sunday Jan. 21. Full sets from our current medalist quartets and invited superstars will headline two evening shows. The youth festival gets bigger every year, (thanks to your support of Harmony Foundation), and has participants from around the world. The youth festival is a big draw, and the International Senior Quartet Contest will feature the best of our seasoned performers.

Last year a Senior Chorus Festival was added to the Convention. Districts may create a Chorus with current (dues paid) members with a minimum age of 55. I am happy to announce that our FWD Qualification Chorus (or FWeD-QuaCk) easily scored enough points and the FWD will have a representative Chorus.

Due to our geographic size and limited time, participation in this Chorus will be similar to Platoon Qualification. Members are expected to have notes and words Quartet-ready when they arrive in Costa Mesa. Email Craig Ewing at cesing10r@gmail.com if you

wish to participate. Include your name, voice part(s), and the name and email of your Chorus Director as a referral. If an FWD Quartet Champ knows your voice and work ethic, they can also be used as a reference.

In addition to the age requirement, you must be current in your dues and have a registration to the Convention. When approved, you will be asked to provide a payment of \$20 to cover costs (music, learning tracks, etc.). You will then receive the two songs and tracks with your voice part.

Our performance at the Festival will be on Friday the 19th, but plan on rehearsals on Wednesday and Thursday (working around the major Convention events) to create a unit.

The men of FWeD-QuaCk raved about how fun it was to qualify. For many guys, Costa Mesa will be a unique opportunity to perform on an International Stage. Also, having the youth in the audience brings an energy that performers seldom get to experience!

Hello, FWD!

Earlier this year, I shared a few ideas that Directors and Music Team members could utilize for establishing core principles for singing success. Briefly, these principles included:

Educate – yourself, your team, and spread the wealth to your membership.

Embrace – rehearsal elements that are designed to continually innovate and inspire singers with fun, achievable, principle-based singing and performance goals.

Eliminate – distractions. Remove aspects of rehearsal that don't directly support the best possible Chapter vision.

Encourage – your singers. Let them know they are capable and that the journey for improvement is worth the team effort.

Execute – Be creative. Don't settle. Get to the heart of what is real and deliver.

Of course, these ideas are simply departure points for discovering what works best for your leadership team and Chapter. Let's expand a bit further upon some of these principles, beginning with *education and development*.

A cornerstone principle of success is certainly continual improvement and renewal of skills through educational resources. Sure, there are offerings online, but we have incredible educational programs in the FWD and we want to offer more. Do what it takes to invest in yourself and your team by attending our scheduled educational events. We need you!

As a Music Director (as well as music team leader), it is vital to be constantly self-aware of verbal teaching skills and gestures that compel the very best singing from your ensemble. When identifying elements to

embrace and what to **eliminate**, the best question to always ask yourself is: "Did it work?" In other words, "was it **effective**?" If so, keep doing it. Otherwise, try something else.

Strive to be as *confident, clear*, and *concise* as possible with specific instructions that support *consistent* goals. These very same principles also apply to non-verbal hand-gestures (conducting) and body-language communication. As **Dr. Greg Lyne** might say, "Stay centered, simplifying your delivery, and look like the music".

Encourage *equal-contribution* from your singers. This starts by fostering trust between the leadership and the Chapter membership. Section leaders must *empower* every singer to bring their most enlivened and authentic self to the party of making great music. To both trust and to also be trustworthy with expressed music / administrative goals. It is so very important that everyone is on the same page and accountable for your Chapter success. Now is the perfect time of year for your team to reflect upon Chapter successes and to also discover opportunities for a fantastic 2018!

We've come to the end of another competition cycle with the conclusion of the Fall Convention & Contest in Bakersfield this past October. Since we're months away from the start of the 2018 Division Contests, this is a great time to highlight some of the process changes that have occurred since 2015, the year I began this journey as your FWD Events Chair. With assistance from many others on the FWD Management Team, we set out on a mission to examine how the District manages and implements the convention cycle, which, at that time, required a herculean effort by Host Chapters. After our initial review, the Board authorized a couple of significant changes. The first involved moving the long-term planning and contracting process for venues and headquarters hotels from Host Chapters to the FWD Events team. The second involved developing and implementing an online registration process. We believed that these two processes were the most cumbersome and timeconsuming for Host Chapters and may have been preventing smaller Chapters from volunteering.

As we moved through the 2016 and 2017 Contest Cycles, further process changes were implemented with the goal of simplifying the interface between the District and Host Chapters and reducing costs. Some of these changes are highlighted below:

 All accounting functions (revenue collection and bill paying) is now accomplished by the Events Team and District Treasurer. Host Chapters are now out of the accounting business and do not have to worry about collecting money for registrations, photographs, program advertisements, hotel rebates, among other things. Further, all Convention costs are paid by the District Treasurer, eliminating the need for Host Chapters to set up


special accounts and pay bills.

- 2. Audio/Visual recordings are now delivered digitally to Contest representatives immediately after the conclusion of each Contest. YouTube-quality mp4 files are sent during the Contest and once the entire Convention/Contest is over a high-definition file is sent.
- 3. Photographers are now contracted by the District for just their time and no longer own the photographs. This change in contracting process now requires the photographer to release ALL digital photographs to the District after the Contest. Based on the number of groups (Quartets and Choruses) a break-even price is established and then offered for purchase, which includes all photos taken for each group. This change in process has allowed the District to substantially reduce the cost of the entire digital set of photographs for each competitor from about \$125 to \$40.

There are numerous other smaller details that have been modified because of other changes. Consequently, we are in the process of updating the Convention Manuals to reflect these changes. Once completed, the Manual will segregate and detail the responsibilities between the District and Host Chapters for each convention type (Division, Division with International Quartet Preliminaries and the Fall Convention). I am expecting that this Manual will be completed, reviewed by other members of the Events Team and ready for presentation to the Board by no later than the March Convention.

If you did not attend the 2017 Fall Convention and Contest you missed a great one. I believe, and I have heard this from many others, that it was the best Fall Contest in many years. The Quartet competition was more than impressive with such a high level of singing and entertainment. The race to the top of the Chorus competition at every plateau is also getting very exciting. Finally, the Show of Champions had to be the best I've seen in the 21 years I've been attending Fall Conventions.

Based on the final registration count there are many of you that missed this Convention. Our Bakersfield location, (on our calendar now every three years), brings with it a very interesting distinction: The highest attended Convention of our Fall rotation schedule. The last time we were in Bakersfield (2013) we enjoyed a registration count of 1,593. This year it dropped to 929. This prompts me to deliver the chart below, which shows our registration count from 2000 through 2017.



I thought our attendance at the Fall Convention had stabilized between 2010 and 2014. The last three years proves that false. Let's be clear: it is a false notion that the District can continue to deliver these Conventions at the venues and hotels you have become accustomed to with such drastic drops in attendance. Given this attendance trend, at the Fall Board meeting I requested that a committee be formed to examine other options available to the District that will reduce the cost of these conventions while improving attendance and participation. That committee is formed and we look forward to discussing new ideas that will tackle this issue. Please don't be silent as others work towards the goal of maintaining and improving our Conventions & Contests. Feel free to drop me a note with your comments at my District email address (events@ farwesterndistrict.org). I only ask that you refrain from making these communications a dump for complaints and negativity without a suggestion for a better way to conduct business. We are looking for ideas and process improvements to increase attendance and involvement at the District Conventions. I welcome all suggestions that might accomplish that goal.



I want to express my sincere gratitude to the Bakersfield Chapter for the outstanding job they did at hosting the Fall Convention. Thanks to an abundance of volunteers, all of the major events as well as registration ran smoothly and efficiently. But beyond that, there were so many extra little touches, from having designated "singing floors" to the canteen for those needing to grab a late-night bite, making it a very pleasant experience for those who attended.

And speaking of that, if you did not attend the Fall Convention this year, you missed a great one. The level of competition this year was truly incredible and very entertaining, and the Show of Champions was the best ever. Marty Monson was just glowing, and I'm sure things were buzzing at Harmony Hall when he returned from his trip.

I have to confess that I was more than disappointed at the low attendance at this year's event. The FWD puts on one of the best conventions in the Society, but we can't continue to do that if it means operating at a loss. I know that Bryan Forbes and everyone on the Board are concerned about this, and we will be taking a hard look at what we can do to continue to offer best-inclass and still make ends meet.

But all of that depends on YOU making the effort to come to these events. As Marty stated so eloquently at the HOD meeting, these are more then just contests, they are times when we all come together to join our friends and celebrate our love for singing.

So next time, besides the outstanding music and entertainment, think about how great it is to get together with old friends from all over the district, to sing tags, share stories, laugh and enjoy the camaraderie that makes being a barbershopper so special. It doesn't matter whether you're competing or not; in fact, I've found that conventions are actually more fun when I'm NOT competing because there's so much to do besides spend all my time in rehearsal.

So I challenge you to think about all that you are missing when you don't come to the conventions. I'll be in Fresno next Fall, and I hope to see you there, too!

Now on to Marketing ...

Chapter Marketing VPs: What are your plans for promoting your annual shows next year? If you don't have a website, you need to get one now! Are you taking advantage of Social Media by setting up a Facebook page? Are you using Twitter? Instagram? Pinterest? YouTube? If these sound like Greek, then you're missing out. This is the 21st Century and there are a plethora of ways to get free publicity that are surprisingly easy to do once you learn how. And what about an email list for your fan base? If you don't have one yet, take a look at MailChip to see what you can do to get started for free. You'll find this and more in the marketing training materials we have at farwesterndistrict.org. Contact me if you would like more details on how to jump on the bandwagon.
