

Led by two young barbershoppers from Las Vegas, the Clark County School District held a Barbershop Harmony Youth Festival on May 6, 2008 at Del Sol High School in Las Vegas NV. Jay Dougherty and Jim Halvorson, both teachers in Las Vegas, organized the event. Jay and Jim are also very active barbershoppers.

Jim Halvorson is a music teacher in the school district and has been a major influence on Barbershop Harmony in the Las Vegas area since arriving there from Minnesota in 1998. Jim, the founding director of the City of Lights Chorus, left the chorus a few years ago and now directs the Celebrity City Chorus in Las Vegas (SAI). Jim and his brother Larry are members of the quartet "Stardust" and will compete this July in Nashville.



Jay is one of two associate directors for Las Vegas Metro City of Lights and is the Choral Music Director of Del Sol High School, where he has very successfully introduced Barbershop Harmony to his students who have formed the all female "Desert Harmony Chorus", as well as two female quartets "EuFOURia" and "FOURever More". A new men's quartet "Gil and the Guys" was formed just for this event. They all performed and were a very big hit! Jay also sings with the quartet "Ready or Not" who also sang at the festival and have qualified to compete this fall in Bakersfield.

In addition to the choruses and quartets from Del Sol H.S., the City of Lights Chorus was invited to perform as was the Celebrity City Chorus. Ring! and Wildfire, both Celebrity City chapter quartets, and Jay's quartet each sang to the delight of the audience of students, teachers and administrators from the school district. Also appearing was the college quartet "Sin City Four", who were recently featured on the Westminster Chorus Fantasy Quartet Show and who are the current SoCal Novice Contest Champs.

"Currently the Clark County School District does not have any outlets for barbershop, and barbershop style singing is not permitted at the annual CCSD Choral festival". observed Jay. In order to attract as many of the students, administrators, officials, and music educators from the CCSD as possible, Jay and Jim made sure invitations were sent to all, and encouraged other choruses and quartets from around the district to participate and perform in the festival. Although they knew it was unlikely that other schools would have time to prepare performing groups for this year's event, this year's show was free, with free barbershop music provided to all student attendees. Hopes are high that after experiencing this festival there will be more choruses and quartets formed to participate next year. As this festival develops into an annual event, Celebrity City and Las Vegas Metro will help by providing scholarships and sponsorships to the youth conventions and competitions held annually by BHS and SAI.

City of Lights and Celebrity City have been very active in supporting Youth in Harmony for a number of years. High School choral groups and quartets have appeared on a number of the chapter's shows and concerts. "The experience has been a truly rewarding one for both the students and our chapter members", said John Thompson, V.P. of PR & Mktg. for the chapter. "It not only made the shows more vibrant, but also brought our attendance up, and allowed us to donate a part of our show proceeds to the music departments of those participating schools. We are very pleased to have been invited to perform here tonight. Jim and Jay have produced a wonderful event!"

"I think we are making progress in accomplishing our mission of promoting and encouraging singing and music education in our schools," said Peter Feeney - Las Vegas Metro Chapter President. "We are very proud of Jim, his hard working chorus and Jay for producing this event this evening. It has been so much fun to be here with the young people of our community--seeing them enjoy themselves singing their hearts out and just having a grand old time. At times like this, I very fondly remember the great Uncle Lloyd Steinkamp and all he did for youth in harmony. I think he would be proud of what happened here tonight."

FWD Bulletin Editor of the Year

Mark Sheldon, of the Orange Chapter was named the FWD 2007 Bulletin Editor of the Year (Large Bulletins). Mark, a first time contest editor, competed in the three disciplines of Layout and Presentation (600 points) Grammar and Style (400 points) and Content (600) points, attaining a total score of 1488 (three issues) which qualified him to be entered in the International Bulliten Contest.

2007 FWD Presidents Award

The recipient of the 2007 FWD President's Award has made a significant and outstanding contribution to our Youth in Harmony program during the last ten years.

Because of him, over 15,000 middle school and high school students have been introduced to Barbershop.

Because of schools are appearing on chapter shows, a student was able to attend national honors choir in New York City, music educators were sponsored to Harmony College West and Harmony University,



and a local school was provided with the funds needed to continue a music program.

As results of his efforts, over \$12,000 has been donated to school music programs, boys have been attending our youth camp, boys quartets have formed and flourished, and one quarteter in particular proudly wears both International quartet and chorus medals because Ron helped him get started in Barbershop.

The latest data I have from Society Headquarters indicates that the decline in membership continues. One of the biggest factors seems to be that the non-renewal rate is rising. Why would that be? Well - some possible rea-

- Age just not up to to it anymore physically and/or mentally.
- Death difficult to renew after you've departed this
- Disenchantment no longer getting the "fix" you used to get.

• Time - lotsa choices for activities - some perceived as more compelling than barbershop.

Whatever the reasons, I'm betting we can fix some of To that end, we've developed a Membership Workshop scenario that I hope can be delivered to each and every chapter. It's truly a workshop - no lectures, no interminable PowerPoint slides - just an opportunity to get together with your friends and peers to explore ways to recruit and retain members. There are definitely ideas out there that bear food for thought.

Witness, for instance, the Sacramento Chapter. Membership VP Joe Samora set out at the beginning of the year with a goal - a simple goal - to add 2 members per month. As I write this column (at the end of April) he's right on target - 4 months, 8 new members. Better yet, to my knowledge, no members have departed the chapter thus far this year!

What's Joe's secret? No secret - he simply does what he set out to do:

- He developed a plan and sticks to it.
- He's always on the lookout for potential members, and asks people to visit.
- He sees to it that guests are welcomed warmly, and that members participate in the welcoming experi-
- He assigns a "buddy" to guests and new members, and follows up to make sure they're doing their job.
- He makes sure that new members are properly oriented, mentored, and encouraged to get involved.
- He has an active committee that meets at least once per month to discuss plans and progress.
- He schedules guest nights regularly, and ensures that the experience is a positive one for guests and members alike.
- He maintains a constant, contagious positive attitude - no matter what.

I could go on, but I suspect you get the point of the italics in the foregoing. Joe doesn't do anything that any one of us couldn't do. The difference, I think, is that he just - well - does it! Common sense stuff - know what I mean - stuff that Joe would be happy to share with other chapters. I'm certain you have similar ideas within your chapter to likewise share with others.

You don't have to be a Membership VP, or President, or Board Member, or any of those high-falutin' things to participate in a workshop - just someone who's interested and involved in membership issues. Those two things certainly do go together. MUSIC: That is what our whole society is about. PERFORMANCE: That is how we present to our audiences the music we have learned. The better we know our music and the better we perform it determines how large or small our audiences will be.

Harmony College West has ONE purpose! To bring together instructors and coaches who will help you increase your knowledge and abilities in a multitude of skills, so that when you leave HCW you will be smarter, better, more skillful and more excited about our great hobby!

And speaking about our instructors and coaches, BOY do we have a super staff this year! As we did last year, registration will begin at 12:00 noon. And a brand new class you won't want to miss! Brian Philbin, the coo-coo bass of Metropolis, will be teaching "The Comedic Approach - Barbershop and Humor 2. Need I say more?

Since Barbershop is all about singing, it is only logical that we should learn to take care of what we sing with - our voice. Craig Ewing will help you learn to use, not abuse your voice. Better to take care of it than to have to repair it. (From the voice of experience).

There are nine other classes which will be offered. Check their class descriptions on the FWD website under "Harmony College West 2008".

Don't forget the "Early Bird" prices are good only until June 15th. That is the same price it has been for the last 7 years!That is \$150 per man. And we have to have your money by then. If we get your money after that date it will be \$175.

Now for you quartets! We have the finest coaching staff in the history of Harmony College West. We have 8 International Gold Medal winners, 7 District winners, 9 Judges, 2 directors of International Chorus winners among our coaching staff.

"Mr. Barbershop"

Neil Keefer has had a truly illustrious musical career in music. By the third grade in Paso Robles, California he was playing the violin. Soon he was in the elementary school orchestra, followed by membership in the high school orchestra. Next, he sang in operettas and the church choir. After graduating from San Jose State University, he eventually moved to Pacific Grove, California. There he sang in the Monterey Presbyterian Church choir.

About 1956 a neighbor asked if Neil would be interested in singing with a barbershop chorus, and the rest is history. Neil joined the Paisano Barbershop Chorus of approximately forty men, and began singing baritone after beginning in bass. The first of many quartets Neil was to sing in was called the "Monterey Jacks," no doubt a reference to the cheese Monterey is famous for. This group sang at California's First Theater, a historic building which featured olio and vaudeville along with such melodramas as The Drunkard.


Neil's next quartet was the "Three-Alarm Four." This hilarious group wore firemen's helmets, red suspenders and custom-made shirts, and carried a ladder onto the stage. They often sang in Carmel's Sunset Auditorium. Neil recalls one occasion when the fire department siren went off unexpectedly in Carmel just as the quartet was beginning to sing, and the audience began laughing uproariously, thinking it had been done on purpose. In 1961 Neil joined a quartet called "Sons of the Beach," but he remembers it was very hard to get the group to rehearse, so he dropped out. (Perhaps the quartet's name didn't help either!)

It was Neil who suggested the name "Cypressaires" for the new name of the Paisano Barbershop Chorus in the early 1960s. He thought "aire" would be a good ending for a name and realized that the cypress tree was strongly identified with the Monterey Peninsula, hence the new name.

At about this time Neil joined a quartet called the "Plus Four." The members specialized in comedy and became so popular that they sang together for several years. The quartet chartered a plane and sang in barbershop shows from San Diego to Seattle, visiting seventeen cities on consecutive weekends. On another occasion the Plus Four was invited to sing in Hawaii for a week and sang at various service clubs, the Hawaiian Stock Exchange, and several other venues, even getting on television in the Meanwhile, the quartet was entering various Islands. competitions in the Far Western District, such as in Pasadena, San Francisco, Fresno, Sacramento, etc. They always scored in the top ten.

Other quartets Neil joined were the "Tonsorial Parlor Harmony Association" and the "Main Streeters." The latter name came from the group singing at the Farmers' Market in Salinas on Main Street. Another quartet he sang in was the "Fat City Four," named for a King City, California cattle feed lot. In this group Neil sang lead for six to eight years. In the 1980s Neil sang with the "Happy Kondriacs." The Plus Four was then reconstituted, and Neil sang with this group until about 2003.

From 1968-1974 Neil directed the Cypressaires. He is now retired but remembers his rich musical career with wonderful memories. In 2007 Neil was awarded for 50 years of membership. He is truly "Mr. Barbershop" of the Monterey Peninsula.

As we enter the second half of our championship year, we figured it was about time that we shared a little bit biographical information about us with you. Even though we've all been around the FWD for a long, long, long, LONG time (sheeze!), there may be some new folks out there that don't know who we are and from whence we came. So, for what it's worth, here's some trivia about VocalEase.

VocalEase decided to buy matching socks and get serious about this barbershop singing thing back in October 2005. After a trial rehearsal where we sang every song we could remember (and many we didn't know at all), another "long-distance" quartet was born.

About 2 years after our first rehearsal, we were fortunate to win the Far Western District Quartet Championship in Phoenix. In addition to bringing home the quartet gold that weekend, we were honored to receive the first Llovd B. Steinkamp Standing "O" Award. This award is bestowed upon a quartet in the contest that the audience feels is the most entertaining among their peers.

Todd Kidder - Tenor

Todd joined the Vacaville Chapter of the Society in 1971 after having sung barbershop-style music for about 8 years with his father and brothers. He served as an assistant director for the Vacaville Chapter for several years.

Todd's first quartet, Kidder & Sons, Incorporated was formed in 1969 and took home the FWD championship in 1987. He first sang with Rich Brunner and others in 'Rad Dads', and in joined Rich again in 'Freestyle'. He is a veteran of the International stage, finishing with 11th in International Competition in 2002 with Freestyle.

In VocalEase, Todd is pleased to once again share the stage with 'little brother Scott', a goal they have for many years.

Todd and wife Diane live in Vacaville, California and have five grown children, Emily, Jennie, Bryan, Brandy and Jennifer, who married Christopher Bell, and have added three grandchildren to the clan, Christine, Matthew and Nicholas. He has been a law enforcement officer for twenty years and is currently a Sergeant with the Contra Costa County Sheriff's Department.

Rich Brunner - Lead

Rich began singing barbershop harmony in 1978, when his high school music teacher (a member of the Dapper Dans) started a high school quartet. He joined the Sacramento Chapter in 1982, and has been a member since that time.

While attending UC Davis, where he earned his degree in Music, Rich sang with a college quartet, the 'Davisville Student Forum', all of whom became members of the Sacramento Chapter as well.

Rich has been a FWD Champion on three occasions, first with 'Musician's Choice' in 1988-89, with "Freestyle' in 1999-2000, and again with VocalEase in 2007-2008. He has been an International competitor 10 times, including 5 semifinalist appearances with Freestyle, which achieved 11th place in 2003.

When the family relocated to Clark Air Force Base in the Philippines in 1969, "Papa" Don decided to satisfy his barbershop needs by forming a quartet with his three sons. While in the Philippines, the family quartet entertained troops and eventually won an Armed Forces talent search to appear on the Ed Sullivan Show in March of 1971.

After returning to the States in the fall of 1971, Kidder and Sons, Inc. spent much of the next 20 years performing on barbershop shows and competitions across the United States and Canada. Kidder and Sons finally won the coveted Far Western District championship in 1987.

Scott has earned 6 gold medals with the Masters of Harmony, serving as both Lead and Baritone section leader; and has sung in several other quartets, most recently with bass Joe D'Amore in Finale - 2001 Far Western District champions and 2002 International finalists. He is thrilled to finally have the opportunity to once again share the stage with his "older" brother Todd.

Scott works as a Senior Programmer/Analyst for Maxon Furniture, and lives with his lovely wife, Cindy, and wonderful sons Ryan and Kyle in Irvine, California.

Joe D'Amore - Bass

Joe became a member of the Pasadena Chapter in 1979 and fell in love with the barbershop style of music. He soon became the chapter's musical director and sang in his first barbershop quartet (The Crowning Attraction). Joe sang bass in the Far Western District Novice Champion "Sound Horizon" in 1982.



Erin and Greg have provided valuable coaching insights the Masters hope will help them win Gold in Nashville. Dr. Lyne will take his turn and bring his unique perspectives to the Masters' rehearsal in late May.

Thanks to the efforts of MOH chorus member and Bakersfield resident Bill Rosica, the Bakersfield Association for Retarded Citizens (BARC), agreed to sponsor a benefit concert on April 19, at Bakersfield's historic Fox Theater. BARC is a local organization long known for its successful training and rehabilitation programs for the area's disabled and disadvantaged. This was the first Masters' appearance in Bakersfield in two years. concert program also included current Far Western District Quartet Champion VocalEase, as well as MOH quartets The Crush and Expedia.

"Outstanding In Front" Directors' intro is outstanding all-around

There are many harmony-oriented activities and programs the society indisputably does just-right, in which participants might experience the beauty of a remarkable performance or gain musical or artistic knowledge well beyond what is expected. The "Outstanding In Front" introduction to directing, delivered at Venice High School on March 29th, is one such program.

It's human nature for people to feel awkward when asked to stand in front of others to demonstrate some skill they've not yet mastered. So with some trepidation, about two dozen people came to the class, uncertain of their comfort levels with what they would encounter. Most were BHS members, but also present were several SAI singers and local choral directors. Conducting the class was Mike O'Neill, the society's Music Educator and Chorus Director Development Specialist, well-armed with musical knowledge beyond his years, dispensed with such warmth and confidence that all present felt immediately at-ease and comfortable.

After a quick introduction to the program, Mike began discussing the specific directing skills needed by practitioners, including posture and body alignment, arm and hand positioning, downbeat and ictus, preparatory and closing arm and hand motions, etc. Everyone mimicked Mike's movements, directing themselves singing familiar BBS tunes, "Let Me Call You Sweetheart", "Down Our Way", "Sweet and Lovely" and several others. Some time was spent demonstrating the different arm patterns used for two, three and four beat time signatures, as well as during timing changes such as rubato and fermatas, etc.

Unexpected but quite fitting with the overall flow of information were somewhat-lengthy discussions of related topics. "Building a Functioning Team" discussed creating chapter roles to enable the director to do what he loves best while putting others in key positions to lighten his load; "Leadership and Relationship" emphasized the elements needed to build open, honest and positive relationships between all chorus members: genuineness, mutual respect and positive mindedness. Participants remarked that the qualities being discussed were also critical success factors for building successful community groups and business organizations.

Several technical topics were presented. "Sound Management" discussed and demonstrated how posture and alignment, breathing and body support affected sound production. "Improving Our Singing" delved into the importance of a singer's attitude and amplitude, air flow, resonance in producing vowel sounds, singing without tension and habits to build; "Developing A Unit Sound" asked a number of singers to sing phrases several times, each time focusing on and boosting their unity of sound, so the entire class clearly recognized the remarkable improvement.

The seven-hour class introduced and presented a great number of topics central to the directors' art and spent considerable time discussing small differences in approach and practice that would help determine the quality of a director's ability to effectively control the flow and performance of a chorus. It became evident to all that in order to become an effective director, many, many hours of dedicated practice would be required; yet all came away with a firm foundation of information they could build upon should they decide to pursue the director's track. All society members having an interest in directing would do well to participate in this class whenever an opportunity to do so presents itself.

Youth Harmony Camp 2008

This is truly an honor. When Dean Scoville told me that the district wanted to honor me in this way, I thought, why me? My immediate reaction was that it was because I have been leading the AFWDC for so many years. But when I wrote the biography that Dean told me to write, I realized that I have had many varied jobs and experiences here in the Far Western District and at the International level. Throughout this weekend, many of you have been coming up to me and saying, "I didn't know you did this or that. I didn't know you were Young Men In Harmony Chairman." Well, yes I was. I took over for the great Carl Walters. And by the way, I apologize to each of you who took the time to read it (2 pages) in the program. I didn't think that it would be there in its entirety.

Of course, no accolade happens solely because of 1 person. I have many people to thank. And I told Judy Steinkamp that I wouldn't take too long. She told me that I better not because Lloyd was up there waiting to cut this mic cable if I did.

Firstly, I must thank my family who are all here this weekend: Queen Gerry, our oldest son Jesse, the International College Quartet Champion Sammy and our Rock and Roll Star Nicky. Nicky, mom and I hope you make it big so you can pay off our house! And of course, you all know my "other wife," Queen Pam. Many of you knew Gerry and me before our Big Fat Greek Wedding, and then watched and helped our kids grow up to be outstanding men and great barbershoppers and musicians. For that, we can never thank you enough.

Throughout these years there have been those dedicated barberhoppers who served as mentors to me as well as many others. There were so many! Throughout the 80's and 90's, I was fortunate enough to have been on the founding Board of the FWD Chorus Director's Guild. That board was comprised of Howard Mesecher (chairman), Lloyd Steinkamp, Russ Young, Lou Laurel and me. Howard, Lloyd and Lou were excellent role models and teachers. Russ and I were entrenched in barbershop knowledge and protocol. And, as you can imagine, great stories.

In the Contest and Judging Program, specifically the Arrangement Category, I was touched by an angel - Lou Perry. He helped school me in just how to arrange a barbershop song. He always told me that it was easy to arrange a song in 8, 10, or 12 parts, but arranging only 4 parts was very difficult. He was also very special to our entire family. He would visit us in Redondo Beach often.

In fact, he and Ruth sent Gerry and me a special gift of a sand painting. It was an Indian picture of fertility. Sammy was born 11 months later!

But back to my beginnings. There were guys like Emmet Bossing, Lynn Britten, Mike Senter and Jack Hines - all judges helping out a very young (for those days) quartet. Who (of those of us old enough to remember) could ever forget the woodshedding parties at Jack Hines' house? He had an old barber-chair in which the lead singer sat, while the other parts stood and sang around him. I can remember being in that chair with Jack (what a woodshedder he was), Emmet, Milt Rae, or Doug Anderson standing around. And if anyone ever tried to sing anything that resembled an "arrangement," they would be thrown out.

And I would be remiss if I didn't thank the man who brought me up in this hobby - my barbershop father, Earl Moon. He was the most influential man in my barbershopping life. And, of course, it wasn't just Earl. Millye would keep us all in line! Twice a month (sometimes weekly) they would host a young college-age quartet, coach them, and preach them the barbershop gospel. Millye would always feed us; most of the time it was her rich chocolate cake and milk. But she would always vell out her opinion from the kitchen or her china-painting room. "Hey you guys, that was horrible. Get it in tune!" Years later I went on to co-direct the Whittier Chapter with Earl in its hey-day. I feel fortunate to have been the only one Earl let direct a song with the chorus in a district contest while he was at the reigns.

Obviously with a wife who is a two-time International Champion in Sweet Adelines International (Gerry and Brian Beck are the only individuals who have been in a finalist quartet in all four parts!). I have also been mentored by many outstanding musical minds: Bev Sellers, Joni Bescos, Ruby Rea and Sylvia Alsbury, to name a few. And there were many others I can assure you.

And then there were all of those guartets I was fortunate enough to be a part of. Each and every man with whom I sang has influenced me, taught me valuable lessons, and been like a brother to me. So please indulge me:

Many of you old enough to remember, are aware that I forgot one quartet. Well, I didn't. Each of us who are blessed enough to sing in a quartet, on that stage over there, have special memories. When I was a sophomore at Occidental College in Los Angeles, four of us from the 90-member, world-renowned Occidental College Glee Clubs happened upon this amazing musical style. The four-some you all got to know was Peter Beers, baritone, Kevin Smith, Bass and Russ Walker, tenor. However, the original quartet consisted of Peter, myself, Tom Krenek, bass and Steve Barclay, tenor. Peter owned two barbershop recordings: the Pacificaires and the Golden Staters. We spent hours writing down each of the voice parts of each of the songs on each of those records. And those were the songs that we sang. We weren't clever enough to come up with a really great name, so we settled with "The Occidentals." Pretty good, huh?

At the college, we would put on forty-five minute shows for the Occidental Community in the College Chapel each quarter. We didn't even know that there was a society we found out much later that Peter knew about the society because his high school music teacher was a barbershopper. But one of our classmates father was a big-time barbershopper. He was one of the Far Western District's best MC's - Jack (do you have a minute?) Kelly. He grabbed us after one of these shows and told us he was going to take us to this meeting where there was a lot of this style of music being sung.

So Jack took us to a meeting of the Crescenta Valley Chapter. Well, we listened to the chorus a little and then they introduced us, and we sang. They went crazy. We were feeling like stars! So we sat down feeling pretty self-assured, and then this guy introduced another quar-Gentlemen, please welcome the current International silver medalists, The Pacificaires!. more we listened the more we sank in our chairs. WE had just sung their songs, and not as well as they did! Boy they were fantastic! (we were fortunate to have Al Mau as a coach for many years) We were hooked, and the rest is history!

Well, almost history. The Crescenta Valley chapter had a "six-week rule" which said that prospective members had to wait six weeks before they could actually become members of the Society. There was a divisional contest that Jack wanted us to enter, but it was only 4 weeks away. Not to be deterred, Jack called Mike Senter who was directing the South Bay Chapter. Mike got Jack in touch with Dave Briner who told us all to come to a performance at a local mall. We sang for the Chapter, as

well as the people in the mall. The board immediately went into a private meeting (rumor has it that Dave told their board to approve us), and we were immediately inducted into the South Bay Chapter. In the vears to come, Peter would become a long-time director of Crescenta Valley, Russ would become a long-time director of the Ventura chapter and I would become a long-time director of the South Bay, Fullerton, and Whittier Chapters. This little quartet was a great "find" for our founding father Jack Kelly, and for our district.

And then THE REST WAS HISTORY. District Champions in 1977, International Finalists, and shows all over the country. We began at 21 and ended at 30. The four of us (me doing most of the leg-work) began our champs' organization in our championship year. Budgets in the district were getting tight and expenses for everything were climbing. I talked to Hank Brandt of Grandma's Boys since he started the first organization in Illinois. Our FWD Champion's organization has been in existence for 31 years. That fact is a result of one guy in the district being a mentor to a group of young men. My only regret is that I don't get to see Peter, Kevin, Russ, Tom, and Steve at these conventions, but they are all doing well and told me to say hello to you all.

So to all of my "Quartet Friends" here this weekend to qualify for International - it is now our time! We have taken and learned, and it's now our time to take over for our mentors. It is our time to be mentors - to teach what we've been taught from the greats. Ours is the greatest district in the Society. All of the ideas and programs that the FWD initiates, eventually make their way to the International Office - Young Men In Harmony, The Chorus Director's Guild, The High School Quartet Contest. It's now our time to be the Presidents, the Judges, the faculty members, the committee chairmen. It's our time to "find" those new singers and teach them the barbershop gospel. None of us will know how and where our teaching will take hold, but you can be assured that it WILL take hold. It is now our time to be the "biggies" and continue to keep the Far Western District at the top of our Society.

Again, I am extremely humbled by this honor and I thank you with all of my heart.

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For those who could not attend the district convention in Bakersfield, you missed a great time. Once again, Division 3 had very low attendance at the House of Delegates meeting. I encourage you to ask your chapter leadership to make sure that your chapter has a voice and a vote at the HOD. Although I represent the division on the district board, the HOD is the primary governing body, and every chapter has a vote if they send a representative. Some very important decisions have been made in the past few years, and I want to make sure all chapters of our division are represented.

An interesting thing happened at the afterglow of my chapter's show on April 26. The story starts a couple years ago when the quartet Late Show first formed. They had videotaped one of their early rehearsals and posted it on You Tube for the heck of it. Among the many people who viewed the video was a young man in Texas who decided after watching Late Show that this barbershop thing was pretty cool, and he wanted to know more about it and joined the Society. Flash ahead to the weekend of April 26: the same young man from Texas just happens to be visiting Stanford University where he will start school next year as a freshman. He learned about the Palo Alto-Mountain View Chapter's show from the web and saw that Late Show, the quartet that got him interested in barbershop, was headlining the show! He came to our show and the afterglow, where he met Late Show and told them his story. If someone can calculate the odds of that coincidence occurring, please send them to me.

The story has a couple of lessons. The first is the growing power of the Internet in attracting the attention of the younger generations we need to perpetuate the Society and the barbershop style. But the second part of the lesson is equally important: the content posted on the web. I didn't think to ask the Texas fan why the Late Show video grabbed his attention, but I can make some educated guesses. First, Jordan, the lead of Late Show, was still in high school at the time the video was posted, the same age group as the viewer. Second, even the video of an early rehearsal of a future district champion likely displayed some pretty darn good singing. Knowing the guys in Late Show, I doubt they would have posted anything on the web that did not show either themselves or barbershop in a good light. The power of the Internet is a double-edged sword. The right kind of content will attract new singers from whatever demographic you seek, but content showing poor quality will do quite the opposite. Please remember, too, that anything you post that identifies your group as affiliated with the Barbershop Harmony Society not only reflects on your group, but on all of us. Do not underestimate the power of the Internet, and please post responsibly (and legally --- do not forget copyright law).

As summer approaches, remember that the best way to promote ourselves is to get out and sing in public. Art festivals and other outdoor summer events provide a great opportunity to make ourselves known. Just like the web, be sure to know your audience and present your group in the best possible light. Have a great summer.
