As the proud President of the Far Western District, I am happy to tell you that great things are continuing to happen in our District, like for example our performances at the International Contests in Kansas City. The chorus gold medal (actually medals since there were 121 of them) came back to the Far Western District yet again with The Masters of Harmony's eighth win in a row. MOH is now the second winningest chorus in history. Our other two qualifying choruses also did well with Voices in Harmony in the top ten and Spirit of Phoenix in the top twenty. Our quartets, too, did so well with Masterpiece taking in third place, The Crush placing just out of the top ten and 95 North way up there, too.

And I think I broke a Society record – in my two years as District President a chorus from my District won gold each year! On the non-competition front, we were also proud of two of the inductions into the Society's Hall of Fame – the late, great Earl Moon and recruiter superb Jerry Orloff. OK, enough drooling. Well done Far Western District.

Your District Board recently conducted a follow up to the June planning session in Fullerton. The goal was to set goals and then to work out how we can achieve them. One of our three main goals was to help chapters improve the quality of their singing and as a result of our discussions, I can tell you that chapters are going to receive more help and encouragement than they have ever had before. We recognize that better singing means a better chance to attract more new members and a better chance that existing members are going to have more fun than ever.

The Learn to Sing program is now under way, with many chapters anxious to participate. At the time of writing this article, flyers have been sent to those chapters and instructors are being assigned. I continue to say that this will be a learning process for us all, but with high hopes that it could be an ongoing program with success stories everywhere.

By the time you read this article, the District will be well on the way to surveying every one of our chapters, per the Society's request. I'm trying to help out by surveying as many as I can in the Greater Los Angeles area. It gives me the chance to visit chapters, to meet and greet their members and to learn how each of them is doing. I will have visited 12 or 13 chapters by the time I'm done and I'm already enjoying every minute of it.

One of the things we have learned from chapters so far is that they are open to assistance of all kinds. Sadly, most chapters, like most members of chapters, still have not explored the wealth of help that's available on our FWD and the Society's web sites. So yet again I encourage not only chapter leaders, but every member to spend just a little time each week plow-

ing through the mass of information that's there to see. There is so much to be learned.

Be adventurous. Make a habit of it. This is your hobby.

I have a feeling that the upcoming Fall Convention in Fresno is going to be one of our best ever. Hotel rooms have gone fast and the quality and the number of competing choruses and quartets is high. If you don't delay, you may just make the September 8th deadline for the amazing early-bird fee of just \$40.00, especially if you register on-line.

Oh, by the way, did I mention that it's great to be a (Far Western District) barbershopper?

The Barbershop Harmony Society Hall of Fame was established by action of the Society Board of Directors as a means of bestowing Society recognition and honor to members and quartets -- living or dead -- for exceptional contributions made that have enhanced the life blood of the barbershop experience for the Society. Honorees are selected by a five-man committee, each committeeman serving a five-year term; terms are staggered so that each year the current Society president selects the chairman and the replacement for the retiring member.

Any living or deceased Society member, Society staff member, or quartet, with the exception of the current Society President and/or any current Hall of Fame committee member, is eligible for nomination. Quartet nominations are considered to be for the quartet as an entity and not as individuals. Honorees are selected by a majority vote of the committee, and there is no maximum or minimum limit on the number of inductees in a given year.

The award criteria used by the committee fall into general categories of music and administration/leadership. In music, judging, arranging, composing, chorus directing, coaching and singing are important. In administration/leadership, service as an officer, advisor, and in planning, writing or editing are considered.



## Earl Moon - 2011

Earl Moon (1928-1996) was a junior in high school in Kansas City, Missouri when a Barbershopper, Joe Stern, introduced him to barbershop. Earl joined Society in 1945. Later that year he joined the Navy and ended up in Long Beach,

California in 1949. There he met and married Millye. In 1950 they welcomed their daughter, Melanye.

It was in the Far Western District where he developed and honed his skills as one of the greatest Barbershoppers ever. Over a period of years he sang with the Long Beach, Santa Monica and San Fernando choruses and directed the Downey Chorus to a third-place medalist position at the 1961 international convention in Philadelphia.

From 1970 and for the next 25 years he directed the Whittier Choralaires and taught tag singing and woodshedding at Harmony College. During all those years he sang baritone in many quartets including the Far Westerners, who placed in the top ten at international for all ten years of competing.

Earl was one of the most outstanding teachers the Society has ever known. He was a prolific arranger, master barbershop craftsman and coach. When he passed away in March of 1996, the outpouring of love and admiration from fellow Barbershoppers was incredible to behold.



## Jerry Orloff - 2011

For more than four decades, Jerry Orloff has been a major creative spirit behind some of the Society's most effective and lasting programs in membership recruitment and in showcasing the best in barbershopping throughout the world. Largely to his

credit, Auditions for Admission, the World Harmony Jamboree, the World Harmony Exchange, and Sing With the Champs are efforts that have made immeasurable positive impact upon both our existing membership and the viewing public. Jerry epitomizes the "Man of Note," having sponsored over 200 men into Society membership-- a record unequaled.

Jerry and wife Kim have organized and/or participated in numerous performing and teaching tours including such destinations as Mexico, China, Australia, New Zealand, Ireland and Russia. He is also one of the founders of the Mixed Harmony Barbershop Ouartet Association providing assistance and support for those who wish to sing in a mixed gender mode (often with a spouse).

This man's sharing of the joy of our art form has spanned the globe and resulted in his singing barbershop harmony in Chinese, Maori, and Russian! He remains active in his local chapter in Northern California and heavily involved in introducing and propagating barbershop music in the community high schools. Jerry Orloff is unquestionably one of our giants of preservation and encouragement.

He confirmed that he was indeed the same guy and with his half page of BBS resume under his signature, it looks like he's not lost his love or passion for our "sport", but excelled in it. He approached me a couple of months ago, and to my great surprise, said it was time for him to join us. He's a great addition to our bass section, and a great addition to our "Take 4" quartet."

Congratulations Jim and I know you're ecstatic!

And a Man Of Note report from the Aloha Chapter: Bill Joor, a 57 year barbershopper is at it again. He just brought his 10 year old grandson Eli, into the fold. 30 years ago, Mike his son, was 4 years old when he joined us. Now, all three Joor's are heading off to Brisbane to sing with the Sounds Of Aloha Chorus in competition. Good luck and what a thrill that will be gents! (How old was Bill when he joined us)?

## **Midwinter Youth Chorus Festival** In Tucson in January

You've all heard the reports: Over 600 young men in 19 choruses from as far away as Canada and New Zealand participating in last January's International Youth Chorus Festival in Las Vegas—and what a blast it was! Over 100 of those young men were in four choruses representing the Far Western District.

This next January, the event once again is in our own front yard! How many groups will be participating from the host District?

With school back in session, now is the time to renew contacts at schools, and get plans under way to participate. Entry information and details will be coming from International sometime this fall, and will be circulated on our web site.

In addition to high school-based groups organized just for the occasion, existing college choirs and other men's a cappella groups are encouraged to participate. There are three age-levels for the competition: groups with an average age under 25; groups with an average age under 21; and groups with an average age under 18. All it takes is a chorus of 12 guys to enter. Thanks to Harmony Foundation, most of the costs are covered—hotel rooms in Tucson, at least one meal, and convention registration—so the main cost challenge is just transportation.

Can there be any better opportunity to promote barbershopping by youth? Even if you can't get a chorus together, if you've got a young man who's interested, I'd urge you to get him in the lobby of that headquarters hotel, and experience the cacophony of chords, the brotherhood of tag-blasting, that goes on when all that youthful singing energy gets together. It's a life-changing experience.

In this issue I wanted to highlight the charitable work of one of the District's smaller choruses, the Gold Standard Chorus of Santa Cruz, CA. One of the reasons I picked them was because of the variety of ways that they have found to re-invest in our hobby and in music in general.

The chorus has established the Ken Brosius Memorial Scholarship award, in honor of one of the founders of the Gold Standard Chorus. Each year they contact the twelve high school choir directors in the county to recommend a graduating student whom they feel is worthy of a college scholarship. Students are evaluated on a number of different criteria, including demonstrating leadership in their music activities and intention to major in choral music.

Santa Cruz was kind enough to share a couple of the letters of recommendation they received from the school choir directors. Two things were clear. Santa Cruz has established a wonderful relationship with the local schools' music programs, and they receive applications for very talented and deserving students. This year, the chorus was able to award two scholarships totaling \$1,500 to two excellent candidates.

In a very different vein, Santa Cruz sent some financial help half way around the world following the devastating earthquake in Christchurch, NZ. Some members of the chapter had become acquainted with the Christchurch Sweet Adelines Barbershop Chorus when they were in California for the international competition a few years ago. Friendships remained, and following the earthquake, the Santa Cruz chapter was made aware of the shortage of affordable drinking water for the NZ chorus to use at rehearsal. Donations were accepted from chorus members, and a check was forwarded to the Christchurch chorus to help maintain a sense of normalcy during a difficult recovery period. What a great idea!

Finally, the Santa Cruz chapter makes a point of sharing barbershop singing by performing in the local high schools. This year, they were unable to do that due to scheduling difficulties for their own quartets. However, one of the local high schools agreed to let their quartets come to perform at what turned out to be six of the other local high schools. They provided their own transportation and performed at no cost. The Santa Cruz chapter made a donation to the providing school's music program to express their thanks.

My good friend, Bill Sabina, baritone in my quartet, We're 300 and Holding, for the past eight years, recently moved away to be closer to family. He and I often discussed our sadness in the removal of the word "Preservation" from our Society's public name. In his most recent letter to the FWD membership, President Bernard Priceman said, "although our name has changed, we are still officially the Society for the Preservation and Encouragement of Barbershop Quartet Singing in America." He emphasized the word "quartet" in his article. I'll emphasize the word "preservation." My view is that the way we preserve is by doing exactly what the Santa Cruz chapter has done this year: (1) encouraging young people to further their study of music; (2) helping our fellow barbershoppers; (3) sharing the barbershop sound at every opportunity. Thank you, Santa Cruz for your wonderful efforts this year.

## 2011 International Chorus Champions The Masters of Harmony

## A Return to Kansas City

In 1985, a small group of men decided they wanted a more satisfying barbershop experience. They formed the Masters of Harmony, a chorus "Dedicated to Musical Excellence." In November 1987, barbershop icon Dr. Greg Lyne became their director. Twenty months of his leadership produced such remarkable improvement that chorus members believed they could become the first barbershop chorus to win gold on its first try. It was not to be as three talented and more experienced choruses finished ahead of them at the 1989 International Convention in Kansas City. In a remarkable display of introspective self-criticism, some chorus members met to analyze the contest results with a passion that matched what they had just taken to the contest stage. Out of these meetings came a steely determination to reach for the top in San Francisco in 1990. Lessons learned from 1989 helped produce four International Chorus Championships during the 1990s - three led by Dr. Lyne, one by Jeff Oxley, and three more by the indomitable Mark Hale in the new millennium. Now, twenty-two years later, the 2011 International Convention offered the MOH family an opportunity to return to the city that had been so pivotal in that pursuit of "Musical Excellence."

The escalating scores earned by recent chorus winners convinced Masters' members they would have to go beyond anything they had ever done on the

International stage if they were to repeat as chorus champions. Accordingly, meticulous plans for the 2011 contest were made many months ago. result was a three-pronged plan, one full of both risks and opportunities.

Part one involved choosing a contest package that fit chorus strengths. Part two involved learning vocal techniques that helped choruses like The Westminster Chorus and The Northern Lights (Toronto) produce the clean, well-balanced sound of a gold-medalist quartet. Part three involved positioning the chorus in shotgun formation, something the Masters had done only briefly in 1999. Simultaneously developing world-class excellence in all three areas was a lot to ask and, in the early months of the plan, it produced noticeable frustration.

The Masters already had an excellent uptune in the rollicking "Alabama Jubilee," a 1915 song composed by George Cobb with lyrics by Jack Yellen. Aaron Dale did a terrific job arranging the song with updated lyrics, and Erin Howden worked her usual choreographic magic to help produce a lively uptempo song with stunning visual appeal. Then, choreography coach Justin Miller, who had worked so well to interpret and teach Erin's choreography, accepted a job in Connecticut and some wondered how the chorus would react to the loss of Justin's exceptional talent. Well, front row and baritone section leader Patrick Claypool stepped up to the plate and hit a home run. He proved to be adept at teaching Erin's ideas and even "tweaked" them to make them a better fit. The music part of the plan really began to jell when MOH Director Mark Hale and

bass Dr. Rob Campbell collaborated on the arrange ment of "Stranger In Paradise," a stunningly beautiful ballad from the 1953 musical Kismet. When the learning tracks were released to chorus members, it was "love at first sound!" Chorus members now knew they had a terrific performance package to present in Kansas City.

Mark called on Royce Ferguson, an MOH member, quartet champion tenor (Revival) and the director of Westminster's first gold medal success, to work intensively with the chorus to produce a tighter, cleaner chorus sound – one with the pitch, balance and ring characteristics needed to perform at the highest possible level. His vocal exercises seemed strange at first and took time to master, but those standing in front of the chorus began to hear what individual members did not . . . noticeably improved sound.

To take full advantage of Royce's tireless work to improve chorus sound, Masters' men were placed in modified shotgun formation. No longer would each section stand as a group. To some on the risers, this was the most frustrating change of all. Many MOH veterans, who had faced audiences from one side of the chorus for many years, now had to reprogram their brains to perform choreography from the other side, do it in time for the annual spring shows, and then have it mastered for the International stage in Kansas City!

On May 21, the Masters staged their annual spring shows, this time at the San Gabriel Mission Playhouse, featuring The Westminster Chorus as guest performers. The show titled "The Dream is Carried On" reflected the close relationship between these two champion choruses.

On May 26, Dr. Lyne returned to Cal State Long Beach for coaching session designed to help the MOH identify and correct problem areas in the performance package being honed for competition.

In early June, chorus members met at mile-high Idyllwild Pines Camp for a weekend retreat filled with rigorous rehearsals. Once again, Erin Howden

was there to help polish the plan she had so skillfully crafted the year before and Patrick Claypool enhanced so effectively. Sometime on Saturday afternoon, any lingering uncertainty about MOH preparedness just seemed to vanish, and chorus confidence levels soared to levels that would be needed for the challenges waiting at International.

As things turned out in Kansas City, the Masters of Harmony would need every bit of that lengthy preparation to win by 5 points (out of 3000) over Minnesota's Great Northern Union. In its best International performance ever, GNU's stellar contest package "brought the house down" and almost let them squeeze by. MOH outscored GNU in the Singing and Music categories, while GNU clearly won the Presentation slot. Adding to MOH's reputation as producer of quartet excellence were Masterpiece, 3rd-place medalists, and The Crush, improving to a 13th-place finish.

On July 24, the Masters got their first opportunity to perform as the 2011 International Champion with a sold-out appearance at San Diego's First United Methodist Church, a site last visited four years ago. A delightful surprise for both Masters' members and the audience that filled Linder Hall to capacity was the presence of Ann Blyth, who starred in the 1955 film version of Kismet. The Masters were delighted to honor her distinguished 41-year career with an especially moving rendition of "Stranger In Paradise," the song she helped popularize a half-century ago.

Sadly, along the road to Kansas City, the Masters lost two members who had contributed to the Masters' success. Bruce Guthrie, who had joined the Barbershop Harmony Society in the mid-fifties, was a four-time gold medalist with the MOH. Haven Kolls, a member of the Barbershop Harmony Society for 47 years, earned seven gold medals with the Masters of Harmony.

Since the last report, the Masters have welcomed Cristian Carbajal, Richard Dawes, Ethan Pence, Antone Rodich and Ricky Uyehara into membership.

# 2011 SoCal Comedy Quartet Contest in Orange

The 2011 Southern California Comedy Quartet Contest was held July 30, following the 2010 reintroduction of the event that had been a tradition of the Palomar-Pacific Chapter for many years. For a second year it was hosted by the Orange Ouartet Chapter, with many contributing their time and skill to make it a success.

The organizers set participation rules designed to encourage broad participation and creativity while seeking to maintain tasteful humor and good barbershop singing.

(Relax, ASPCA: No actual pigeons were poisoned in the production.)

All the other competing quartets (alphabetically: A Good Start, Bleu Lite Special, Broadcast, and Not Quite Kosher) also contributed to a successful and enjoyable event. Last year's winners, Fantastic Shenanigans, entertained while the judges tallied the results.

This year's winners will be the next to have their names inscribed on the Don Galvin memorial travelling plaque dating to the contest's years under Palomar-Pacific sponsorship. The Orange Chapter looks forward to adding more names to that plague as they carry on the tradition of promoting good barbershop comedy and quartetting through this contest.







## Where did all our quartets go?

When Far Western District leadership offered me the newly created position of FWD Quartet Activity Chairman I jumped at the opportunity. I did this 'cause I love quartet singing and 'cause we have been seeing a BIG DECLINE in number of quartets in our district. We have 44% fewer registered quartets today than just 8 years ago. While we've had a loss in membership during this period, the loss in number of quartets was TWICE AS LARGE!

## **FWD Quartet Activity** Chairman **Mission Statement**

'The Far Western District Quartet Activity Chair (FWD OAC) promotes Ouartet Singing throughout the Far Western District, consistent with the goals and program of the FWD and its chapters. The FWD QAC will work with District and Chapter leadership to conduct activities designed to give opportunities to FWD members to sing in quartets. The FWD QAC will work with each chapter's Quartet Activity Chair or other designated liaison to address quartetting activities consistent with the needs of that chapter.

Consistent with the resources allocated by the District, the FWD QAC will support Quartet Training and other resources for Quartets of the District, support Quartets wishing to become Registered Ouartets, and be available as an Ombudsman for all FWD Quartets."

by John Miller - Society Board Society Board of Directors meeting summary July 4-5, 2011, in Kansas City

## Old Business:

- Ed Watson reported that District Presidents (DPs) have decided to continue spring conventions in their present form for the time being.
- The Board Annual Planning Cycle Committee (APCC) reviewed proposed changes to the Society CEO's aims for 2012 and beyond. Further revisions will be made for approval at the fall meeting.
- The President's special task force to study the impact "permanent guests" are having on the Society recommended no response or action.
- EVP Shannon Elswick assigned Board members to attend district fall HOD meetings as Board Representatives, distinguishing those from separately assigned "Board Liaisons" to the districts.

## **New Business:**

- The Board approved appointment of Interim Executive Director Larry Deters.
- The President's Management and Finance Task Force reported progress on developing final recommendations

regarding improved communication, cash and debt management, financial status and relationships between the Society and Harmony Foundation.

- A new CEO position description for recruiting purposes was approved.
- The Board approved a recommendation to pursue a website document organization plan.
- The Board approved affiliation of the Spanish Association of Barbershop Singers (SABS).
- A proposal to schedule the fall board meeting in conjunction with the mini-forum in Dallas is being considered.
- The new Comcast video on demand cable channel was demonstrated.
- Existing Board officers (President Lamson, EVP Elswick, Treasurer Cooper, IPP Biffle) were elected for an additional one-year term for 2012.
- New board members Joe Cerutti and Garv Plaag were elected effective 1/1/12 to replace Gary Parker and Ted Devonshire, who are completing their three-year term 12/31/11.

District Presidents' Council: The Board met jointly with the DP Council, receiving presentations on the new Operation Harold Hill starting 1/1/12 and the Society board member election process. There was also an open forum of discussion on a variety of topics.



## **Far Western District Fall Contests**

The Far Western District has an annual contest system for the purpose of determining the district quartet and chorus champion. Certified judges in Music, Presentation and Singing adjudicate the contestants in all contests. The contest sequence starts with the Spring Division [5] Contests which qualify the contestants for the Fall District Contests. Both the quartets and choruses sing 2 songs in the Division Contests to qualify for the Fall finals. The chorus competitors sing 2 songs in the Final contest and they are ranked in accordance with those scores. The quartet competitors sing 4 songs, 2 in the Friday night Semi-final contest which determine the top 10 quartets that proceed to the Saturday night Final contest to sing 2 different songs. The cumulative score of all 4 songs determines the quartet ranking.

The winning chorus also becomes the FWD representative to the next International Chorus Contest which occurs in the following year around the 4th of July. See the back cover for upcoming Internationals.
