

MOH Honors Host City Generosity

A strong spirit of gratitude for generosity extended to the **Masters of Harmony** by the City of Santa Fe Springs was much in evidence this past holiday season. For over 30 years, the host city has provided its excellent rehearsal hall at no cost to the chapter, saving it many thousands of dollars. The MOH repays this generosity in several ways:

- <u>Participates in the city's annual Christmas</u> Tree Lighting Ceremony. This program draws hundreds to the Town Center Plaza for an evening of musical entertainment by local youth and adult groups as well as a mini-concert by the MOH.
- Provides quartets for the city's enormously popular Christmas Float Program. The program consists of two floats. The first float features quartets provided by MOH volunteers. This year, under the leadership of Bill Niemand, 26 MOH members sang at each of three stops, at one point inviting neighborhood kids up to the stage with them while proud parents snapped pictures. A float carrying Mr. and Mrs. Santa and a group of elves follows the quartet float. Neighborhood kids get free candy canes, then

- have their pictures taken with Mr. and Mrs. Claus. MOH singers have been taking part in this unique city event since 1990.
- Collects donations to help the city's less fortunate. This year, along with food donations, a "pass the hat" during one rehearsal quickly netted \$370 to help city residents in need.

Harmony Foundation Support Rewarded

The generosity of MOH members was on display in another way. The Society's Harmony Foundation has a program that returns 30% of member contributions back to the donating chapter to help support its activities. Individual member contributions to the Foundation were such that the MOH received a check for \$12,180.

Masters of Harmony Christmas Shows

The 2017 Annual Christmas Shows were staged on December 16 at the Carpenter Center, Long Beach, and on December 17 at Colony High School, Ontario. The theme was "A Wreath of Carols." Under the guidance of Show Producer Ron Andreas, the shows smooth pacing kept the enthusiastic audiences continuously engaged from the opening to the closing curtain two hours later. The shows began with a powerful opener, "Gloria," based on "Angels We Have Heard On High." They closed with an unscheduled encore by soloist Les Weiser, "Please Come Home For Christmas." Audiences rewarded Les's dynamic interpretation interspersed with his sax and harmonica interludes with thunderous applause that said, "Welcome back, Les. We've missed you!"

In between, audiences enjoyed songs by Masterpiece (Brett Littlefield, Rob Menaker, Alan Gordon, Patrick Haedtler) and The Newfangled Four (Joey Buss, Jackson Niebrugge, Ryan Wisnewski, Jake Tickner). In one of the most unusual performances ever seen on a MOH



stage, LeAndra McMullen provided beautifully stylized sign language known as Interpretive Motion to "What Child Is This" and "Believe." The Mina Choi Trio (Mina Choi, Stephen Dizon, David Lubliner) entertained arriving guests and provided instrumental accompaniment for several

songs. The shows left many audience members describing what they had experienced as "the best MOH Christmas show ever!"

Annual Awards and Installation of Officers Banquet

On January 3, 2018, members of the Masters family assembled at the Yorba Linda Country Club for the Annual Awards and Installation of Officers Banquet. Alan Gordon starred as Masters of Ceremonies, Director Justin Miller and President Jackson Niebrugge gave rousing speeches, and Dr. Chris Peterson delivered the keynote address. The major awards for 2017 went to the following members: Barbershopper of the Year-Patrick Haedtler; President's Award-Maurice Freleaux and Mark Freedkin; Director's Award-Craig Ewing; and Quartet of the Year-The Newfangled Four.

The Masters Perform at the Midwinter Convention

On January 20, the Masters performed on the Saturday night Grand Finale to the International Midwinter Convention at the Segerstrom Center for the Arts in Costa Mesa. The stunning beauty of this multi-tiered hall almost takes one's breath away and its incredible sound reproduction rivals that of Disney Hall.

Among the performers gracing the finals stage were: the All-Chapter Chorus directed by Justin Miller; the top four quartets from the 2017 International Contest in Las Vegas-Main Street (Champion), Signature (2nd),

After Hours (3rd), Throwback (4th), plus Vocal Spectrum (2006 Quartet Champion) and the Perfect Gentlemen of Disneyland's Dapper Dan fame. The Masters received standing ovations for each song in their foursong set. The audience was especially delighted to see "Too Darn Hot," the uptune that won the Gold in Las Vegas. They were then joined on stage by members of Westminster and Harborlites choruses who had performed earlier, meaning that the risers then held over 200 members of three Gold Medal choruses. The combined choruses sang "Harmony," a beautiful paean to the belief that music can help the better angels of our nature to prevail.


To conclude the finale, over 500 members of the youth choruses who had been taking part in the week's Youth Chorus Festival joined them, filling the four tiers above the main stage as well as the main hall aisles. With the accompaniment of world-renowned organist **Christoph Bull** on one of the world's finest theater pipe organs, the mass of singers sang The Battle Hymn of the Republic with such fervor they almost blew the doors off the concert hall! The Midwinter Finale was a truly unforgettable feast for the eyes and ears for all who experienced it and a fitting way to wrap up a thoroughly successful midwinter convention. Bravo to the event planners . . . and good luck trying to surpass it!



Singing with Lou Laurel

Lou Laurel came to Phoenix in 1966. He said his first meeting with the Phoenix Saguaro Chapter of barbershoppers and the Phoenicians Barbershop Chorus was attended by only about thirty men. However, by the fall there were enough singers to win the Far Western District chorus contest. This was a continuation of Lou's history as he had previously directed the El Paso, Texas Border Chorders chorus to the international championship. Lou had also served as president of the barbershop society.



The Phoenicians under Lou's directing went on to earn 3rd place finishes at the international chorus contests in 1967 and 1968. They were disappointed to come in second in 1970 in Atlantic City. However, on July 8, 1972, the Phoenicians won the international chorus contest by 123 points. Lou was now the only chorus director of two different international champion choruses.

The Phoenicians repeated their international victory in 1976 in San Francisco and 1983 in Seattle.

Over the years from 1966 to 1989 when Lou retired from directing, the Phoenicians won the Far Western

District chorus contest eleven times. Winning the Far Western District chorus contest became something we came to expect, even in 1987 when we won by only one point. We even had barbershoppers commuting from Nevada and California to sing with us.

I joined the Phoenicians in 1971. When I arrived in Phoenix on Wednesday, August 11th, it was too late in the evening to attend the chapter meeting. But on the 18th, I found the Knights of Columbus hall where they rehearsed, and on October 9th in Pasadena sang with the chorus as we won the Far Western District chorus contest, beating San Diego who had just placed 2nd at the international contest. Of course, this was a high point of my barbershop singing, but it was excelled in July in Atlanta when we won the chorus contest. I sang with the chorus again in 1976 and 1983 when we repeated our international victory.

As a member of the Phoenicians, I was proud to stand on the risers. I speak only for myself when I say that I saw Lou as our leader, not only as our director. Lou stood tall, both literally and figuratively, exuding class and savoir faire. Lou had that certain something the French call je ne sais quoi, an inexpressible quality which is almost impossible to put into words.

Over the years I served numerous barbershop chapter roles from president to music vice president, from historian to show chairman. In all of those roles, Lou was supportive as he had given his heart to singing.

Maybe Jim Miller of the Louisville, Kentucky Thoroughbreds Chorus or Jim Clancy of the Dallas Vocal Majority Chorus were equivalent to Lou, but in my eyes, there was no one who could match Lou. He was truly the greatest.

When I came to Phoenix, various members joked about Lou being able to walk on water. One joke concerned a barbershopper who had died and gone to heaven. As he looked around, he saw someone and asked, "Is that Lou Laurel over there?" The answer was, "No. That's God. He just thinks he's Lou Laurel."

Lou Laurel was truly incomparable. Singing for and with him was a gift.

We invite you to assist in this expanded outreach by contacting groups in your specific community We have an introductory letter available and are always available to assist you in meeting with groups to discuss Harmony Camp.

Funding is always a challenge and in 2017 we also invited community organizations to join us in supporting Harmony Camp. Again, I am available to meet with organizations in your community to discuss Harmony Camp. Our goal is to increase the funding of Harmony Camps through financial support within our communities and through the growth of the Lloyd Steinkamp Endowment Fund for FWD Harmony Camps.

Lloyd Steinkamp Endowment Fund for FWD Harmony Camps **Double Match Challenge**



WHY NOT CONSIDER A CONTRIBUTION TO THE LLOYD STEINKAMP ENDOWMENT FUND **FOR HARMONY CAMP**

The Double Match Challenge for the Lloyd Steinkamp Endowment Fund for FWD Harmony Camps has been extended into 2018.

With the goal of providing an opportunity for all barbershop members to participate in the funding of Harmony Camps in the FWD in perpetuity, a major donor has agreed to continue the double match challenge in 2018. Your contribution in any amount up to \$400 will be double matched by this generous donor. For example a donation of \$100 will be matched with \$200, effectively yielding a \$300 donation to the Steinkamp Fund. You may make a onetime donation or donate on a monthly basis.

Lloyd Steinkamp was a true giant in the Far Western District and it was Lloyd who created the concept of Harmony Camp. The first camp was in 1996 at Camp Wrightwood near San Bernardino. This was not only the first Harmony Camp in the FWD, but also in the nation.

Today the FWD Harmony Camp remains strong with 92 young men attending the 2017camp in Pollock Pines, CA. The purpose of the Lloyd Steinkamp Endowment Fund is to provide, in perpetuity, supplemental financial support for weekend long Harmony Camps within the Far Western District of the Barbershop Harmony Society. Initially all funds donated to the Endowment will be used to build the capital of the fund toward an initial goal of \$200,000. Once the fund balance reaches this goal, withdrawals may commence to help finance the FWD Harmony Camp, consistent with the policies of the Sacramento Region Community Foundation.

You may also donate by check payable to Sacramento Region Community Foundation with a note in the memo box "Lloyd Steinkamp" and mailed to 955 University Avenue, Suite A, Sacramento, CA 95825.

As of December 31, 2017 the Lloyd Steinkamp Endowment Fund has a balance of \$64,000. Our goal for 2018 is to increase the Fund by at least \$60,000. I invite you to join me in ensuring that Harmony Camp will exist into the future for the benefit of future barbershoppers.



Happy 2018. It is an honor to serve as District President. I am pleased to serve with a tremendous team of volunteers dedicated to deliver the best possible experience for everyone in the Far Western District.

Choral harmony has been a constant in my life. I started singing with my family as soon as I could make a sound. While my three brothers accused me of being tone deaf, my Choir Director (Allen Keopke) encouraged my deeper than expected voice. From Church to School Choirs, Allen nurtured me with needed praise. He taught me the value of working to be the best possible - to strive for perfection. I moved on to my college Glee Club and then Barbershop. Allen became a noted conductor and composer. His music is consistently chosen for high school All-State music contests and performed in colleges across the nation.

Life came back full circle at our Midwinter Convention. In 1966, I had the thrill of singing the Battle Hymn of the Republic at the Iowa All-State Music Festival with the best high school singers and musicians under the direction of Richard P. Condie, conductor of the Mormon Tabernacle Choir. A few weeks ago (52 years later) I was on stage with the Masters of Harmony, the Westminster Chorus, the Harborlites and 600 youth singers. We sang the same Battle Hymn arrangement under the direction of Justin Miller accompanied by world renowned Organist, Christoph Bull. The Associate Director of the Tabernacle Choir (Ryan Murphy) was in attendance.

My 1966 experience in Des Moines was life changing and I could sense that the 2018 experience in Costa Mesa changed more lives while thrilling this 69-yearold Bass. That is the power of our strategy: **Everyone** in Harmony. There will be a ripple effect as those

600 youth singers return home and share. We are changing lives.

SW Division, home of the International Champion Chorus the Masters of Harmony, who further distinguished themselves by performing at the recent Midwinter Convention and also capably hosting the Convention. The Newfangled Four Quartet were also spectacular performers at the event and we're looking for big things from this young and fun Quartet in competitions this upcoming year.

I couldn't attend the Midwinter Convention due to the closure of the 101 freeway, linking Santa Barbara with the rest of Southern CA. The devastating Thomas Fire started on a Monday night in December. As my Santa Barbara carpool mates and I were driving south to our Pacific Sound Chorus rehearsal we could see an orange glow way off in the distance towards Santa Paula. And we could also see it was very windy. During our rehearsal several of the guys got calls from their spouses to come home, so we broke up a little early. By the time I drove home we could see the flames in Ventura, fully 10 miles downwind from Santa Paula...it had spread so rapidly.

The next morning we learned that two of our Rincon Beach members had lost their homes. member lost an outbuilding but his home was spared. Several others were evacuated for days.

And as if that were not enough, the fire spread from Ventura, up the Rincon, to Carpinteria and then to Montecito. Both in Carpinteria and Montecito the fire burned the hills down to the first rows of homes and the heroic firefighters, in hand-to-hand combat with the flames and flying embers, saved hundreds of homes.

But the firefighters couldn't anticipate a 200-year rainstorm just three weeks later, and you've all heard of the resulting mudslides, with boulders the size of SUVs tumbling down the hillsides, tearing homes completely from their foundations, sweeping at least 21 to their death, and filling up the US 101 with mud and debris. Former FWD President, Bob Lally, lives in Montecito and his home was spared, but he was evacuated for almost a month and is now back home but with a yard covered in mud.

Despite the losses and the fact that all the Santa Barbara-based Rincon members, including director Mike McGee, could not drive to Ventura for three weekly rehearsals, the Chorus is doing well preparing for Singing Valentines, and upcoming competition. There are four new prospects in various stages of membership auditions. Things are well with Rincon.

San Luis Obispo is having some membership problems. They are down to 10 singers but according to Director,

Logan Miernike, they are still singing well, optimistic and planning to grow again. There are plans again for SLO to join Santa Maria to compete in Irvine...

If you're a member of a Chapter that isn't currently competing, but that's an activity that you would enjoy, consider becoming a dual member of a Chapter that competes. Most competing Chapters would welcome you, as long as your presence "adds" to the ensemble.

Jim Browne is the Director of the recently merged Conejo Oaks Channel Islands Chapter, and he's enjoying sharing about five of his singers with Rincon **Beach.** The additional musical work at Rincon is making better singers and everyone is happy.

Santa Monica Chapter is thriving with new members and great organization. South Bay Chapter is always fun, and planning great shows for 2018 and both Chapters will be competing in Irvine.

San Fernando Valley is also healthy, although "aging..." They plan to sing in March. Crescenta Valley has had a little resurgence with a couple of energetic guys trying to increase their membership and perform more in their communities. Santa Clarita Chapter last year was considering merger possibilities, but last I spoke to their Director Ray Johnson, they found cultures were different and that's no longer on the table.

Pasadena Chapter, under the direction of John Minsker, is small but active. They invited Southern CA Quartets to come sing for them to not only get experience, but also as an audition for their upcoming show in April.

The MOH (Santa Fe Springs Chapter) is very strong, their leadership is young and energetic and they have a lot of very capable folks who seem always willing to help. They also have experienced guys who would be willing to coach other Chapters in the area. Don't hesitate to reach out to them as they are willing to share and encourage.

I e-spoke to Mark Conching, Director of the Aloha **Chapter.** They are doing well, performing a lot, gaining new members but also losing a few as they have a

sizable percent of the membership who are military and often move. They try to travel every 2-3 years and their next plans are Japan in 2019. It will probably be a few years before we see them in a Fall FWD Contest again.

I plan to visit them in April. There's just no telling the extent of what I will do to support this Division...



"CHORD" ially, Dick Whitten

This is my first Westunes article with my "new hat" on, that of NE Division VP. So I thought I'd share some thoughts about what makes a great Barbershop Chapter work.

#1 - Ring chords

This is the prime directive. There are many great reasons why we are doing this hobby, but what hooked us is the first time you heard chords ring, or even better, when you sang and felt that happen. Anytime we gather to sing, be it Chapter meeting or Quartet rehearsal or convention, ringing chords must happen. My favorite saying is "you've got to ring a chord no less often than every 10 minutes!" And there are many tools for a Chorus or Quartet to use to assure that happens more often. One, of course, is to sing a tag (or two). Not a brand new one, but one you know, so there's no waiting for the reward.

#2 - Smile more

This is strongly correlated to #1 above. Of course ringing chords makes you smile. But any other activity we do in our social gathering that allows smiles to happen is a bonus. In one of my first Quartets two members had a plethora of jokes to tell every time the Quartet met. So I assumed that being in a Barbershop Quartet was 50% singing and 50% laughing. In a previous Chapter, a member who was a prolific joke teller would always have one prepared. So just before the Chorus was going on stage, he would be ready to deliver. How great it was to be laughing before hitting the stage. (Good for support preparation, too.) Any

of our gatherings, Chapter meeting, Chorus rehearsal, Quartet rehearsal, afterglow, benefits from the uplift that creates a smile.

#3 - Sing songs you know

One real good choice that past BHS leaders produced was the Barberpole Cat Songbook. How great it is to be able to have easy songs you really know to be able to sing with three others. But wait, don't forget #1, it's about ringing chords. How many times do we just "sing through" these songs, rather than really focus on the chords. If we sing the first word/chord really well before continuing, many more will follow. When you finish the tag, don't just stop. Go back and sing just the tag again, it will be better this time. The above is true for songs your Chorus or Quartet already know, too. Get the first chord to ring well, then continue. When we sing tags at an afterglow, we always go back and repeat. So why not do this when singing songs?

#4 – Get to know your fellow singers

A marvelous byproduct of our singing together is that it bonds us together in a special way that singing creates. We experience this in the group we sing with, either Chorus or Quartet. In many of my Chapters, the meeting night afterglow has been special. We get to know each other better. Share our personal lives. Sing tags. Yup, even tell jokes. The joy that singing creates opens the door for us to get to know each other better. In our Chapter, we all individually answered these questions on a form:

Why did you join the Barbershop Harmony Society? Why did you join this Chapter? What are you looking for from the Chapter? What makes you special? What is your biggest accomplishment in life?

Each week, the President picks one of these to read, not naming the individual until done. And he is received with a great warm applause. It's a super way to get to know each other.

I have been a fan of the Barbershop style since I was a child when I heard it for the first time, as many people do, in The Music Man. District Management Team Reports



Hello, FWD!

Hope 2018 is off to a fantastic start for you and your Chapter! It was wonderful to see many of you last month at the BHS Midwinter Convention and I look forward to our return to Irvine for the FWD Spring **Convention** (March 15 – 18 at the Hilton Irvine/Orange County Airport Hotel).

Directors - In the Winter edition of the Westunes, we reviewed some cornerstone conducting and teaching principles that may assist toward ever-strengthening your Chapter's musicianship and performance capabilities.

Music Director Development -

Communication - As Music Director, skills should be layered one element at a time. Attempting to teach multiple elements at once results in confused, sluggish, and imprecise singing.

Strive to be confident, consistent, and clear with specific instruction, while being as concise as possible to keep most of the rehearsal time SINGING time.

Perhaps most important of all, after instruction and the singer's attempts to deliver said instruction, remember to tell them how they did! What degree of success was apparent in the room? How specific can you be with feedback while also fostering a team approach? Discover ways to encourage participation such as asking the group "How'd we do?" Only then are you allowed to move on to the next teaching point.

Incorporating these elements during rehearsal encourages the very best from each singer. Activelistening involvement and equal-contribution singing principles as well are fun through accountability. All great things! So how might a Director best track singer development and accountability from week to week?

Managing Accountability -

There should be a gradual transference of accountability from the Director's stand to the singers - one element at a time. Simplify challenging concepts into bite-size chunks.

Develop a process and unfailingly adhere to the principles of your system. For example, utilizing unison singing to solidify pitch consistency and synchronization in a homophonic line.

Rehearsal Preparation -

- Study the music Use detailed care to make as many musical decisions as you can prior to rehearsal. This approach assists to minimize singer mistakes that may develop into poor singing habits. Identify musical challenges and build for specific successes.
- As Director, you need to know your singers Empower Section Leaders to assist with the processes of constructive vocal assessment and development. This can be done through individual coaching, private sessions, recordings, tag singing, etc. If approached in a positive way, your singers will really appreciate that you and the music team are really paying attention to their progress and contributions to the team.
- Apply music principles into the warm-up Identify concepts that will be addressed during rehearsal and incorporate whenever practical into the chorus warm-up/craft session. Give singers a reason to be on time and focused.

Rehearsal Approach -

- Stay Centered Remember to stand in one spot when you conduct. Stand tall and encourage consistent eye contact with all of your singers to let them know you are paying attention to their efforts. Director body language and hand gestures should also reflect desired musical accuracy and infuse singers with confidence.
- Change the Singing Environment Often Quartets, Octets, Riser groups (rows, wedges), as well as Section or combined Sectional work.
- Enroll Singers in the Processes of Making Music

- The practical structures of rehearsal, individual singing principles, and how staying accountable to those necessary elements will ultimately result in a truly inspired performance.



Marketing wisely on a shoe-string budget

This is the first in a series of articles I plan to publish this year in Westunes that are specifically talking to the marketing guys in our chapters. I do not profess to be marketing professional by any means, but my intention is to share with you the things I have learned after doing this for many years, and hopefully some of you will benefit from it.

Many chapters are struggling to get the word out about their shows, simply because the more traditional approaches to marketing keep increasing in cost, and their annual budget for marketing keeps decreasing. Trust me, I share your pain.

In this issue, let's take a closer look art some of these strategies, and then let's start to think outside the box to see if we can find some ways to get more bang for the buck.

Many chapters are still using printed flyers, neatly folded, stickered, labeled and mailed to reach their patrons. While I do not dismiss this practice entirely, I will suggest that it's an expensive and labor-intensive undertaking that may do well for your active followers, but is not very effective to attract new business. For example, I have my recycle bin strategically placed between my mailbox and my house, which is where 90% of those expensive flyers wind up when they are sent to people who are unfamiliar with your group. Additionally, unless you regularly pay a hefty sum for "address correction requested", your mailing list becomes increasingly out of date, progressively decreasing your return on investment.

If you are hanging flyers around town, put some thought into where they should be displayed so they are not wasted. For example, ask yourself how many times have you stopped to read the handbills that are plastered on the bulletin board at the supermarket, and if your answer is "never", that is probably not a strategic place.

Newspaper ads will reach a much larger market for less expense the mailing flyers, and are most likely a better approach to attracting new patrons, while reaching many of your die-hard fans at the same time. But keep in mind that readership of the printed media is declining everywhere as more and more people are turning to the Internet to get their news. Look for publications that offer advertising in both printed and on-line format, and consider an ad placement in each. If you happen to live in a larger metropolitan area, you will find that the smaller "neighborhood" papers offer much more reasonable rates than the larger papers, and they also tend to get read more since they carry news and features that are close to home. Whatever you do, BE SURE to ask for their non-profit rates!

There are also some "Life after 50" publications that can be considered, and their non-profit rates are usually quite affordable, but keep in mind that they are usually published monthly or quarterly, so in addition to getting your ad placed well in advance, be sure that the timing of their distribution is within a week or two of your show.

Do you have a local PBS station? Consider running in ad in their monthly program guide. That is one publication that DOES get read!

Some churches may be willing to put a short paragraph in their bulletin for free, but also consider offering to provide them with an insert instead. Typically they are 5.5" x 8.5", but be sure to ask them for their page dimensions, and how many copies they will need. The same goes for Elks, Moose, Caribou, Antelope, ... you get the idea.

Run an ad in the show program for a nearby BHS/SAI chapter whose show precedes yours. Their audience already enjoys barbershop, so that's really a no-brainer. And maybe next year they'll return the favor if your show comes before theirs!

Everything we've looked at so far costs money, some much more than others. If what you are spending seems to be paying off, then by all means keep doing it. But always take a close look at some of these other options, because you may find ways to get an even greater return while spending less.

Oh, and speaking of spending less (shameful, gratuitous plug): did you know that you could run a full-page spread in Westunes for only \$50? And quartets can run their business card for just \$12 a year? You'll find our complete list of ad rates and specifications on the FWD website.


