

2018 FWD Fall Convention Honoree Dave Briner

Greatness can be measured in many different ways, one of which is years of service. Our convention dedicatee, Dave Briner, certainly exemplifies exactly that, but not just because of his 60 years of membership in the Barbershop Harmony Society, which is just the beginning of the measure of this man.

In 1958 he began his barbershop career with the South Bay Coastliners, with whom he sang for 29 years. During his early years with the chorus he was chapter president, show chairman, and Barbershopper of the Year. He then performed with the Masters of Harmony chorus for 14 years where he won five gold medals. Since then he sang with the Brea Gaslight Chorus for ten years, and currently is a member of the South County Sound chorus.

From 1964 through 2012 he attended an estimated 60 BHS or SAI International Conventions, many with his late wife Sally, a two-time SAI Queen of Harmony.

For more than 55 years he has arranged music in the barbershop style, and the BHS has more than 90 of his arrangements in their music library.

In addition to singing bass for 19 years with one of the Society's favorite comedy quartets, The Manhatters, he continued his quartetting with Mutual Fun, the 2000 FWD Senior Quartet Champion and International Senior Silver Quartet Medalist in 2000. Other quartets Dave sang in include the Whippoorwills, Sandpipers, and Larceny and Old Bass.

For the past 26 years he has attended the annual Tri-W woodshedding camping trips. For 20 years Dave was a certified judge in the Arrangement category, and for 15 years he served on the faculty of Harmony College. Additionally he was Chairman of the Society Music Publishing Committee for 5 years.

When it comes to greatness it's safe to say that Dave Briner measures up!

SPECIAL FEATURE 1993 5th Place Medalist by Paul Olguin

On Wednesday, December 7, 1988, B.J. Hill, Raymond Davis, Jamie Arrington, and Paul Olguin blended their voices together for the first time. By the end of the first phrase of "Heart of My Heart," they all knew that they had been given a very special gift. Since then, they have done their best to nurture and share that gift with others.



In the Beginning

They attributed their early success to the natural blend of their voices and to the fact that they all loved to work hard at getting things to sound better. Another contribution to their early success were the original songs and arrangements which came from the pen of baritone, Paul, who had recently won the Barbershop Harmony Society's 50th Anniversary Songwriting Contest. After just a few months together, they nearly qualified for International! Later that spring they won the SoCal East Division, and in the fall, went on to place second in their first FWD contest.

Then they met with their first big challenge. Shortly after their second place District finish, the quartet arrived at B.J.'s for rehearsal one night to find a "For Sale" sign in the front lawn. B.J.'s wife, Julie, had received a promotion with her company that required the young Hill family to relocate to Reno, Nevada. After a brief discussion of who the other three might find to replace B.J., Julie suggested that they all move to Reno! Well, after a few weeks of consideration, that's just what they all decided to do! So, following the Hill family by a month or so, Jamie, Raymond and Paul, without jobs or even a place to live, loaded up a 24foot U-Haul and moved to Reno in January of 1990. That year the quartet qualified for and competed in their first International, making an impressive 14th place debut. That fall they went on to win the 1990 Far Western District Quartet Championship. Of their seven appearances on the International stage, they placed in the finals five times, finishing as high as 5th in Calgary in 1993. But their story is about so much more than championships and medals.

Thanks, in great measure, to a brilliant coaching session with the legendary Lloyd Steinkamp, Special Feature became a very popular and entertaining show quartet throughout the Far Western District and the Society. In 1995, they took a year off from competition to focus on new material in the "barber-wop" style, arranged mostly by tenor, Raymond. As a result, they secured a yearly professional gig at the Atlantis Hotel/Casino during "Hot August Nights" as well as headlining many shows with this new focus. In addition to their first two barbershop recordings, they produced an award-winning album called "Street Sounds" which featured their "barber-wop" stuff. Their most recent recording, "Blast from the Past" was comprised mostly of arrangements of pop songs from the 1960s that were "woodshedded" by the guartet.

The quartet's most recent appearance on the International stage was in 1999 in Anaheim, where they were quite happy to place 19th. After retiring "for good" from competition, they decided to pursue a professional career focused on original songs in a more contemporary acapella style. But eventually Raymond missed singing barbershop too much, and decided to leave the group. Shortly after that, Paul missed Raymond too much, and, with Paul's departure, Special Feature was no more . . . or so they all thought.

Fast forward several years to Katie Hill's (B.J. and Julie's daughter, who was born when the quartet was a couple of months old) high school graduation in 2007. She wasn't like so many of her classmates who wanted a car or a trip to Europe for a graduation present. She wanted Special Feature to sing at her high school graduation party, and that's what she got! Well, the guys had so much fun that they hatched a plan to get together again to try to sing on the past champs show for the 20th anniversary of their FWD Championship. Word got around, and several chapters invited Special Feature to sing on their shows. All of a sudden, it was a Twentieth Anniversary Tour, which included a successful attempt to qualify for the International Contest in 2010! Though they decided not to go to International, they did decide that they were having so much fun that they should simply reunite. After one more temporary break-up, they got back together for the last time with only one rule: no one is allowed to quit! Nowadays they get together when they can to rehearse and enjoy one another's company over a long weekend. (They have lived for several years now in Albuquerque, Las Vegas, Reno, and Portland!) They have also been blessed to experience the joy of sharing their music on shows from time to time with friends both old and new.



Harmony Camp 2018

Although our attendance was down in 2018, this Camp turned out to be probably one of the best ever in terms of spending individual time with the boys. Quite frankly this is one of the more rewarding aspects of camp.

The Sound from the chorus was spectacular! That alone told me that the quality of the boys in terms of their singing ability and their attitude was a step up from past years. We ask nothing of the boys in terms of prior singing experience. So it is always a little surprising and reassuring when this kind of high level sound happens. Yes, one could say that the high level sound is coming from the men that are mixed in with the boys on the risers, but that could never explain the volume and the richness of the sound. It is just amazing to hear it and to realize that whatever the cause, it is a truly a not to be forgotten experience for the boys who are hearing that sound and realize that it is coming from them as a chorus. Our Dean, Gabe Caretto, always talks to the boys on Sunday morning just before taking the risers for the show about how this exact gathering of men and boys as a chorus will never ever come together again as a chorus to sing. His message is a timeless one that reverberates with the boys as they think about it and realize that this is a very special moment in their lives, especially with that "sound" that their chorus is creating for the audience of their friends and family!!

Saturday morning and afternoon are devoted to teaching such classes as vocal production and harmonizing with tags. One brand new class taught in the afternoon was *Music Theory with Tags* taught by Chris Mc-Cuddy. Although this class was not well attended, we believe that the class can still be a real winner and we plan to include it in our marketing plans for 2019. I witnessed Chris teaching this class at a high school visit in September 2017. To a person the students were very involved as was their teacher

At the teachers' meeting this year we received a number of great suggestions that we are incorporating next year. One suggestion is to move the date farther into the school year by one month. Therefore **the date of Harmony Camp 2019 will October 18 – 20.** Yes, the weather will be cooler but historical records for Pollock Pines in October reveal not too much change from September. The rationale is that many schools have a rapid ramp up of activity early in the school year that tapers off a bit in October. And one of the "issues" that we have experienced down through the years with our

September date is conflicting auditions for State honors choir. This year was no exception; we had four boys leave Saturday morning to participate in auditions in Sacramento, and then get back to Camp for the afternoon sessions.

In the teachers' meeting we rehashed the all male makeup of Harmony Camp and the value in maintaining that constituency. The teachers clearly recognize the value that results from that makeup that the boys can be boys without the need to "be cool" for the girls. They are more relaxed and more themselves.

Another brand new concept that came up at the meeting was the idea of the boys taking the camp songs back to their homes and schools and trying to sing them on their own in pick up quartets and small groups. The camp songs tend to be just challenging enough for the full chorus, with the added adult men helping, to maintain high interest, but they often turn out to be way too challenging for the boys on their own.

The suggestion was to have a morning class that teaches one or two easy songs that the boys can take back and be truly successful with on their own. That will give the boys more opportunity to incorporate their camp experience at school and with their friends.

As an aside, it does seem that the teachers are becoming more and more comfortable with our philosophies at Harmony Camp, and they also seem more willing to make suggestions. I love it!

Another idea we are working on is to bring a well-respected music educator to camp during the day Saturday to teach the music educators in greater detail what we do and why. With any luck we will be able to offer CE credits for the music educators.

Like all things in life, camp is an evolving experience. I firmly believe that in order to stay relevant, we need to encourage more involvement from folks who are willing to suggest new ideas and directions. We are open to all suggestions.

Lastly, I cannot thank enough all of you who responded to our plea for financial support this year. We ended up with a small excess of funds which will be rolled over to Harmony Camp 2019. I would be remiss if I didn't thank those who spent their weekend with us. It is hard work but a labor of love.



It's the most wonderful time of the year in the Far Western District. Holiday Shows and Parties; Carols and Eggnog; Planning for an amazing 2019.

Many of us are basking in the glow of the **Fall Convention** in Fresno. One Chapter President summed it up on Sunday morning as "spectacular".

Here are some highlights:

• The District Board Meeting (Minutes online): All officers in attendance. NOTE: We have filled every appointed Committee Chair position for the first time in years and offered a special welcome to our latest: **Roe Darnell** (Financial Development), **Dan Jordan** (Historian), **Jeremy Loper** (Membership), and **Steve Salmon** (Youth in Harmony).

• The House of Delegates Meeting (Minutes online): We had an extremely high delegate count with 31 Chapters Represented. Thank You!

• The delegates approved several changes to the District SOP to include a \$20 annual increase in District Dues for full paying members. This (40-cent a week) increase is the first in 10 years and will allow the District to continue to provide support and world class events with a balanced budget. The Board is committed to reduce the registration prices for our events to balance out the dues increase.

• The delegates approved the 2019 Budget and elected the 2019 FWD Board of Directors.

• An innovative "Convention at Sea" concept was presented. It is in active discussion for Fall 2020 with a survey going out to all for input.

• A listening session was held with **Erik Dove** (BHS CFO), **John Miller** (Society Executive Vice-President elect) and **Bernard Priceman** (Society Board Member). It was a conversation with a number of Chapter Members with an emphasis on the gender

neutral (*Everyone in Harmony*) changes to the Society Bylaws. It was very positive

• Our daily convention newsletter edited by **David Melville** and emailed to all with "what happened" and "what to expect".

• Our Traveling History display by **Dan Jordan**. An extraordinary collection of FWD memorabilia and a wonderful bridge connecting members across all generations.

• Our FWD Barbershop Emporium hosted by **Patsy Miller (Lund)**. An eclectic collection of merchandise for sale from many of our FWD Choruses and Quartets with some other stuff thrown in for variety. The money raised went back to the participating Choruses and Quartets to support their programs.

- A very successful Harmony Platoon Event.
- Our Chorus and Quartet Contests:
 - A Joe Barbershop Chorus of over 120 men to test the mics for the Chorus Contest. The largest in memory. *There is always room for more next time.*
 - Twenty Choruses Competed:
 - **The Westminster Chorus** is District Champion with a score of 94.0.
 - The Stockton Portsmen is the first District Mixed Barbershop Chorus Champion.
 - Twenty-four Quartets Competed:
 - Capital Ring are District Champions.
 - R.I.C.K.S. are District Senior Champions.
 - Velvet Frogs will represent the FWD at the Seniors Quartet Contest, but declined.
 - Saucebox are Novice Quartet Champions.
- Three late nights of tag singing and fellowship.

This is just a sample of the fun that was had in Fresno. Mark your calendars for our 2019 Spring Convention in Stockton beginning March 21 and SoCal and Arizona Division Contests in May. There is something for everyone at these events. They are much more than Contests. They are Far Western District Barbershop Celebrations.

Here are a couple of things as we close out this very eventful year.

- Elect (if you haven't already), your 2019 Chapter Officers and consider sending them to a Leadership Summit.
- Discuss the opportunities presented by our new gender neutral Society Bylaws.
 - There is no need to change anything but you now have options that were not available in the past.
 - New standard District and Chapter Bylaws will be ready in the next couple of months.
 - The District Officers are here to help in any way.

Thank you for everything you do for your Chapter and the District.

Keep Calm and Keep Singing – in Harmony.



Well the summer and fall has turned up the heat as far as goings on in the FWD. Of course, "Everyone in Harmony" was on everyone's mind with plenty of questions as to just how is this going to work. Our International in Orlando was a great feather in our cap with Westminster finishing second to our brothers in Dallas. Newfangled Four placed 6th, just 118 points short of earning a medal and Artistic License finished in the top ten at ninth. Thunderbolt finished 14th in the NextGen Varsity Quartet Contest.

Closer to home, the House of Delegates meeting saw a better-than-average turnout for some very important decisions. With attendance numbers falling, the District proposed a dues hike, which was passed overwhelmingly, after much discussion and a presentation by Bryan Forbes.

I mentioned that our Convention attendance numbers are down and talking to members, I found that a lot of folks would like something else to do besides listen to 25 Quartets and a like number of Choruses. So, I have proposed that the 2020 Fall Convention be held aboard a Carnival Line ship while we travel from Long Beach to Ensenada and back to Long Beach. After much research and a couple of visits to the ship by yours truly and Brett Littlefield, we find that the idea would work and the pricing is close to what one would pay on land. One nice attraction is that the Cruise Line would allow paying for the trip over time, so by the time the Convention is held, your trip would be paid for. Normally your credit card gets hit with food and accommodations right after the convention. Your Chapters have been sent the information to discuss with you and to take a poll so we can make a decision.

Finally, we had to postpone our California Leadership Summits because we didn't have enough registrations to make the Summit practical. We will be looking for a venue for both North and South, sometime in January. I would urge every Chapter to take advantage of this one day Summit to sharpen their leadership skills. Stay tuned for more information in the next month or so.

We congratulate the **Westminster Chorus** on their great winning performance, directed by the incredible **Justin Miller**.

Our SW Division claims the Senior Quartet Champs... The Velvet Frogs. They are fantastic entertainers and were again awarded the Lloyd Steinkamp Standing Ovation trophy, given to the audience favorite "mostentertaining" Quartet.

As you'll read in the SW Division digest of Chapter news (thank you **Justin McQueen**) some Chapters are reporting membership success by utilizing Social Media. You all must realize, times have changed and we can't attract members the same way we did in the past. Same for getting people to our shows... I'll try to learn a little more about that and report to you but as you can see, I'm pushed for time. So, I suggest you talk to the digest correspondents from **Pasaden**a and the **Masters** and let's try something new.

Due to some positive personal and business reasons, Mike McGee has given notice at Rincon Beach and he'll be moving to Colorado by December. Courtney Anderson-Georges (my daughter) who is in her fourth year teaching vocal music at Dos Pueblos High School in Goleta, will act as interim director for the several Rincon Chapter's paid shows during the holidays and she'll be joined by long-time Rincon assistant director Jim Browne, who also is the musical director for the Conejo Valley Harmony Oaks Chorus.

All FWD Chapters have been asked to conduct a poll on the possibility of having the 2020 FWD Convention and Contest on board a cruise ship spending time between Southern CA and Ensenada, Mexico. The preliminary result is "excitement" and I personally hope it happens. It will bring a large crowd back to the threeday convention and we're assured the contest venue will be spectacular as the cruise ships were made to be sailing performance venues.

The Masters of Harmony, 2017 International Chorus Champions, have announced they again will be seeking the Championship of 2020 as they enter back into the contest cycle in 2019. I'm sure most of you readers understand the process...when you win the International Chorus Championship (2017) you must lay out of competition for a year (2018), and the following year (2019) you can again begin the cycle. Assuming you can win the FWD championship that year, then the following year (2020) you'll again be competing for the International Chorus Championship. I'm excited for that possibility and will be happy to see them competing in our SW/SE Chorus Contest next May in Ontario.

I hope all our SW Division Chapter members will plan to attend (May 10-11, 2019) and I hope we'll again see 6-8 SW Division Choruses in the competition.

I'm planning to attend the BHS Midwinter convention in Nashville next January 22-27, 2019... These Midwinter conventions, with the emphasis on youth, are becoming my favorite. However, the BHS International Convention is practically in our back yard next July...in Salt Lake City. It's a great city for a convention and very easy to get there. I hope you'll plan to meet me there.



Again, please remember that the District has a program to *help* Chapters pay for coaching. It is called the Chapter Reimbursement Program and it is so underused! It also can be for any type of coaching. For example, if you want to have a voice teacher come to Chapter and teach vocal techniques, this program will reimburse fifty (50%) percent of the travel, meals and/ or lodging up to \$150 per session, \$300 a year *(it does not reimburse any part of a coach's fee)*. Please find the information and paperwork in the "Media" section of the District website! It is the last document under the "Media" drop-down menu, and is titled "Coaching Reimbursement Forms."

Now that the contest cycle has ended, I am sure all Chapters are heavily into learning your Holiday music. If your Chapter will be producing a Holiday Show, or booking caroling outings, I encourage all individual members to help their Chapter Directors in the next few months by learning the notes and words! In essence, LEARN YOUR MUSIC quickly!! This will allow you to get on to the most important part of the music; the fine-tuning, interpretation, and performance of the music. While you're at it, sign up for a committee to help produce the show! And SELL TICKETS!

I must once again remind all Chapter Presidents, Secretaries and Treasurers that they should have made sure that their Chapters had filed all forms for the IRS and State Tax Agencies. Please take care of all Chapter business-related paperwork, so that your Chapter remains in good status, and is not in jeopardy of losing its Charter! If you need help filling out the forms, go to the new **"Member Center"** and watch the videos that show you the forms, how to find them, and how to fill them out! If you still have questions, have your President call me and I'll get the correct person in touch with you! Lastly, the Southeast/Southwest Leadership Summit will take place this January (date yet to be announced), in La Mirada. Each 2019 Board Member should make plans to attend. Executive VP Bill Rosica is focusing the summit's content on "Leadership." Each member of your Board will learn leadership techniques that will allow him to "lead" your Chapter in 2019.

As I sit here writing this article, I am thrilled again remembering the Fall Far Western District Convention in Fresno this month. So many things happened and I was happy to be a part of it. It was certainly one of the most heavily attended conventions in the last few years. The number of people may not have been truly larger than in the past, but those in attendance were everywhere and actively doing everything. We had over 100 men in the Joe Barbershopper Chorus. I haven't been in a Chorus that large since I visited the Sheffield Chorus in England, or the Masters in Harmony in Southern California.

Many of you may have never had the thrill of doing that and if you weren't there you missed out. We had a larger than normal attendance at the House Of Delegates Meeting and many important issues were resolved by the Chapter representatives. Many of you may not realize that the members of the Chapters run the District. You probably think the Board of Directors makes all the decisions in the District but that isn't necessarily true. Many of the items the Board comes up with must be ratified by the Chapters in the District, so if you are not sending a representative from your Chapter you are missing the opportunity to be involved in running your district. Your Chapter has a vote, and if you do not have a representative in the House of Delegates meeting who has read the published report so they know what is going to be voted on and

the reasons behind it, then you are not a part of the decision process.

After the House of Delegates meeting we were treated to performances of the top Quartets in the District in one of the best parade of Quartets I have been at in a long time. On Saturday morning after the Mic Tester Joe Barbershopper Chorus we heard many superior Choruses with lots of entertaining programs. What a time we had at the Fall Convention!

My wife, Isaura, and I drove down to Fresno Thursday morning because as the Northeast VP I needed to attend the Board of Directors (BOD) meeting at 2:00pm. It was scheduled to go until 6:00pm! Now, that's a long meeting! During my career in the military, and also as a pastor, it was my practice to schedule meetings to last no more than an hour. If it took more time than that then we simply rescheduled. I realize there are reasons for such a lengthy meeting, primarily because those of us on the Board are geographically scattered like so much buck shot over the Western states. But, I still like to poke fun at our FWD president and his top leadership!

Now that the FWD Fall Convention is over I can concentrate on my responsibilities as a Chapter Advocate. What is a Chapter Advocate you ask? Well, we are people who try our best to answer questions pertaining to issues that affect the Chapters in the Barbershop Harmony Society. I'm trying to support the District Vice Presidents of our five Divisions in listening to questions primarily pertaining to the recent June 19, 2018 decision to allow women to join the society.

One of the more helpful guides for me and Chapter leadership and members is referenced by asking the question; "has the Chapter contact read the Member FAQs and/or Chapter Leader FAQs"? (*barbershop.org/ EveryoneinHarmony*) This reference answers many of the questions that have been generated over the past few months. The decision to allow women to join the society was not done hastily and the Society Board listened to many legal experts before issuing this proclamation.

In January of 2019 the society will present information that will help facilitate the changing of By-Laws that will address this change in the Society and Chapter operations. What I've been able to garner from conversations with Society personnel and Board members is that if we admit women at the organization level, each Quartet or Chapter Chorus could make its own determination if they wanted to stay all male or not.

We have Chapters that have had women singing in their Choruses for years and they've performed publicly and done many shows with both sexes on stage. The Stockton Chapter Chorus performed at our most recent convention and they were accepted as any other Chorus by the audience. That Chorus format may or may not be for you or your Chapter, but every Chapter will have a choice. Freedom of choice at the local level is all we can ask.

Contest and Judging is investigating adding femaleonly or mixed male/female groups for contest, but our existing system isn't going away. There are many issues to be addressed for future contests and conventions. As you know, currently the conventions are already full of contests and other events that take up many hours and to add more to those schedules will take some master planning.

In my 54 years of membership this is a huge change in how we've perceived Barbershop Harmony. But when OC Cash started this organization he knew there had to be changes along the way to keep harmony alive...and now we've experienced a change that has members buzzing at all levels. Just because we've always done it one way doesn't mean we can't try something new... take a risk, don't be afraid to try!

I believe in the message produced by Maya Angelou; Love life, engage in it and give it all you've got. Love it with a passion, because life truly does give back, many times over, what you put into it.





Marketing wisely on a shoe-string budget

This is the fourth in a series of articles intended to help Chapter marketing teams maximize their "bang for the buck", particularly when faced with a limited budget. Last time we took an in-depth look at the mechanics of developing a website. This time I'd like to revisit the bread and butter for Marketing and PR folks: the Press Release.

I. THE PRESS RELEASE

A press release is a short, compelling news story written by a public relations person and sent to targeted members of the media. The goal of a press release is to pique the interest of a journalist or publication. The press release should contain all the essential information — who? what? where? when? how? and most importantly why? — for the journalist to easily produce his own story.

A. COVER LETTER

It is not always necessary to include a cover letter with your press release, but there are certain events when it can make the difference between your story being covered or not. For example, if your group will be performing in a public place such as a park pavilion, civic building or shopping mall for a sing-out or even a "flash mob" it would be to your advantage to include a short cover letter advising the media of a photo or video opportunity, and refer them to the press release that follows.

B. FORMAT

Let's start by understanding the format of a press release. While there are a number of styles available, I encourage following the Associated Press industry standards as much as possible, as they tend to convey an added sense of professionalism to the journalist.

If you are planning to mail your press release via postal mail, it should be printed on your organization's

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letterhead whenever possible, as that lends additional credibility to your story. If you will be sending it via email, embedding a small image of your logo at the top of the message will have a similar effect.

VERY important if you are sending your press release via email is to clearly identify it as a press release. The subject line of the email message should begin with "Press Release:" followed by the title of your story.

C. HEADINGS

At the top of the first page, type PRESS RELEASE in all capital letters. It should be centered and in boldface type.

Hit return twice to skip a line, and on the left side provide the release date in boldface capitals. If your story should be released on a future date, type FOR RELEASE ON MONTH DAY, YEAR. Otherwise type FOR IMMEDIATE RELEASE.

On the same line as the release date, but on the right side, type CONTACT INFORMATION (or CONTACT INFO.), again in boldface capital letters. Go down to the next line and list the name and phone number of at least one contact person.

D. HEADLINE

The standard press release begins with the headline, arguably the most important four or five words in the whole press release. The headline will be what the journalist reads first. If it's not intriguing, newsworthy and unique, he'll read no further. We'll look at forming a good headline later in this article.

E. SUMMARY

Below the headline often comes a brief, one-line summary of the press release. Like the headline, the summary should draw the reader in quickly and motivate him to learn more.

F. BODY – answer the When, Where, Who, What

While some experts advise to never write a press release longer than one page, others will say to write it as long as it takes to tell your story. Do your best to keep it concise, but don't remove important information just to make it fit on one page. If your press release does span more than one page, it is customary to place a line with "— MORE —" centered at the bottom of each page, except of course the last one.

1. Leading Paragraph

The leading paragraph should begin with a dateline to answer the "when" and "where": CITY, [State,] Month Day, Year – and then continue with answering the "what" in the rest of the paragraph. The city should always be capitalized; the state is typically omitted for major or well-known cities such as HONOLULU, LAS VEGAS, LOS ANGELES, PHOENIX, SAN DIEGO, or SAN FRANCISCO, but when included be sure to use the Associated Press style abbreviations — Ariz., Calif., Nev. — rather than the US Postal Service abbreviations; Hawaii and Utah are always spelled out. Separate the dateline from the rest of the paragraph using an emdash (—).

Examples:

LOS ANGELES, December 1, 2018 — ... SACRAMENTO, Calif., December 1, 2018 — ...

2. Include quotes

Whenever possible, the second paragraph should include at least one quote from a prominent figure in your organization, or better still from a widely known public figure that discusses why this is an important event, adding further credibility to your press release. Be sure to identify the people you quote, using their title and organization in addition to their name.

3. Answer the Why and How

The rest of the body of the press release should answer all of the questions a journalist might have about the product, service or event that you're announcing. Although a press release is a public relations tool, it should not read as overly promotional. If it sounds too much like a sales pitch, it will lose credibility in the eyes of the journalist.

4. Call to action

The last paragraph is where you can make a call to action. This is your opportunity to prompt your target audience to do something. It can be as simple as "For more information visit <u>http://your-website.org</u>". Be sure use the complete URL, including the http:// (or https://), not a hidden "click here" link.

5. Ending

It is a journalistic standard to signal the end of the press release with three hash symbols (###) centered directly below the last line.

G. BOILERPLATE INFORMATION

It is a good practice to follow the body of your press release with additional information. This can often provide the journalist with additional, relevant information to include in his or her article. Quite often this will be the same information, regardless of the press release, so you may want to consider making a template — referred to as a "boilerplate" in the press industry — that has this information already written and checked for spelling and grammar.

1. Organization Summary

Include a short summary about your group beneath the heading "About [your group name]". For Quartets this might include your names, voice parts, and cities where you live as well as how long you have been together and any awards or other recognition you've received. For Choruses, this should certainly include when your Chapter was founded, the approximate number of members, then name of your director, and when and where you meet.

2. Contact Information

Beneath the heading, "For more information — Press contact ONLY:" include the complete contact information of a person the media can follow up with: Name, Organization Name, Phone Number(s), E-mail Address, Company URL. The heading and information should be on the left side and in boldface type.

II. EXAMPLE HEADLINE

As mentioned earlier, the headline is arguably the most important four or five words in the whole press release. The summary sentence that follows is the next most important.

Structurally, the headline should be in boldface and set to a larger font size than the body copy. Conventional press release headlines use the present tense and exclude the "a" and "the", as well as forms of the verb "to be" in certain contexts. The first word is always capitalized, as are all proper nouns, but everything else should be lower-case.

A good practice is to write the body of your press release first, and then write a suitable and intriguing headline and summary.

A. Extract important keywords

The simplest method to create the press release headline is to extract the most important keywords from your press release. From these keywords, try to frame a logical and attention-getting statement. If including a summary sentence after the headline, the same rules apply. Using keywords early will give you better visibility in search engines, and it will be simpler for journalists and readers to get the idea of the press release content.

B. Know your audience

If you will be submitting your press release to *Westunes* or *The Harmonizer*, the following title for this example show would be more than appropriate:

Ringmasters to appear on Masters of Harmony show

It works in this case, because both the editorial staff and the readers of these publications are very familiar with both groups. However, once you leave the Barbershop "inside" world, that title has little or no meaning. So let's replace our title with something that has meaning to the general public:

World champion barbershop quartet, chorus to perform

That title clearly has meaning to a reader who is not familiar with barbershop, and "world champion" certainly adds intrigue. But after reading the article again, I realize that our title is missing two very important keywords that could give more mass appeal. First is the fact that the headline Quartet comes from a long ways away, so we should bring that into focus as a "once in a lifetime" opportunity. Second, the show will be held at a very prestigious venue, adding even more credibility to the event. So let's take another pass, and work those into the title:

World champion singers from Sweden appearing at Segerstrom

For the sake of brevity we've omitted MoH from the title, but we can include them in the summary:

The world champion Ringmasters quartet from Stockholm, Sweden and world champion Masters of Harmony chorus from Santa Fe Springs join together for a spectacular concert of a cappella harmony singing.

From these examples I hope you can see the importance in putting some "spin" on the title to make it as enticing as possible to a massed audience. But to drive the point home, here are some more "real world" examples:

Ice cream social, concert to benefit high school youth Barbershop harmony group delights

holiday shoppers

Singing valentines deliver old-fashioned charm Benefit concert to send area high school boys to music camp

Hometown quartet advances to 5-state regional competition

Stockton singers hold open house Area singers present landmark 75th annual concert Local barbershop singers donate music

to high school choir

Singing group to perform music of Cole Porter Quartet honors fallen officers Local barbershop chorus wins regional title By now you should be getting the idea. III. RESOURCES

IV. CONCLUSION

Writing effective press releases takes practice, and it's always a good idea to have a few people proofread them and offer suggestions, especially people who are not barbershop "insiders" and even better if they have some journalistic experience. Read your local papers to see what kinds of events are being published, and use them as examples for what works. Don't get discouraged if your press release doesn't get picked up. Use a different angle next time, and keep trying.



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
