It's full steam ahead for the 2020 Far Western District Fall Convention Cruise aboard the Carnival Imagination, leaving Long Beach on Thursday, October 8 and returning Sunday, October 11. Folks from all over the country are buzzing about this unprecedented event, and we're anticipating that there will be a large contingent of barbershop enthusiasts coming from near and far to join us for what is sure to be the biggest party ever. Quartet Semifinals will be held on Thursday night, the Chorus Contest and Quartet Finals will be on Friday, and Saturday is set aside to play in Ensenada on the beach, in the water and on-board ship, with the Show of Champions on Saturday night. You can watch the competitions and shows in the theater or on closed-circuit TV in the lounge. Wow!

DO NOT BOOK THROUGH CARNIVAL!

In order for the Far Western District to take control of the ship, we need to have everyone book their cruise through Donna Hisey, our official agent on this cruise. You will also miss out on the additional perks that our group will receive. If you are worried about Carnival points, you will still get all your points by booking through Donna.

If you already did your booking through Carnival, please contact Donna ASAP, and she will advise you on how to switch over to the Far Western District group.

We realize you might be hesitant to put down your deposit and commit to an event so far away, especially if you don't know if your quartet or chorus is going to quality. We've solved that problem! It's an Open Contest. Everyone in Harmony! Any FWD Chorus or Quartet, mixed or unisex, who WANTS to perform/compete is eligible. That's it: you're in! The only condition is that you need to enter and perform/compete in your spring divisional competition, which is a great opportunity to sing before a large, enthusiastic audience and get high-quality coaching on your performance to make October's performance even more fun.

We need you to put your deposit down now. There are still some cabins set aside for the District but they will be released to the general public in April so get your berth now. Whether you are a competitor or just someone who enjoys a barbershop good time, we need you to act now to reserve your cabin and make sure you don't miss out. We can have up to four people in the cabins which really reduces the cost. We have a spot for you and your friends and family. This is going to be a party you won't soon forget. This will be awesome!

In addition to our quartet and chorus contests, and other convention activities, the ship provides a host of activities for all ages, with stage shows, live entertainment, comedy acts, dancing, movies, casino, mini-golf, fitness center, and more. You can lounge by the pool or take a splash on the water slide, and for the ultimate in relaxation you can pamper yourself with a trip to the spa. There are numerous activities for kids, and a serenity adult-only retreat for those who prefer to enjoy some guiet time.

Unlike hotels, cruise ships book far in advance. Also unlike hotels, prices are PER PERSON, not per room; this is because amenities and all meals are included. The Far Western District has locked in group pricing on 500 cabins based on double occupancy. For those on a budget, you can book for three or even four to share a cabin.

The first 500 cabins booked will receive a complimentary bottle of wine and an invitation to a cocktail party (age permitting), hosted by the cruise line. We are also coming up with some additional prizes for the first to pay their fare in full.

Some people have wondered about the cost. Carnival Cruise Lines has sharpened their pencil and given us great rates because they want this to be a big success. Since "lodging" includes all your food, this three-night cruise is actually cheaper than staying three nights at one of our normal FWD hotels. Note: Everyone attending the convention will need to register in advance; there will be no on-ship registration.

A deposit is all it takes to get started

The amount of the deposit varies by the type of cabin and the number of persons. And remember, the total price includes accommodations, all meals, amenities, cruise fare, taxes, port fees and gratuities. Once your refundable deposit is made, you can pay the rest on installments, so by the time you come on board it will be a done deal, so you can relax and have fun on the cruise and convention.

A few things to note...

- Passengers booking as a single will be charged for two deposits and cruise fares.
- Inquire with Donna about optional Vacation Protection Insurance - includes Trip Cancellation, Travel Insurance, and 24/7 Worldwide Travel Assistance. For more information visit www.carnival.com/about-carnival/vacation-protection.
- Convention registration is not included in the cruise fare.
- A current passport is recommended. Proof of citizenship required for re-entry to the U.S.

U.S. citizens can sail on U.S. cruises with ports of call in the U.S., Canada, Mexico, and Caribbean that start and end in the same U.S. port (called a closed loop cruise) if you have some notarized documentation even if you don't have a passport.

In lieu of a passport you'll need an original or notarized copy of your government-issued birth certificate and a government-issued photo ID, such as a driver's license.

That being said, having a passport card or passport book is the most straightforward way to ensure you can get on your cruise without any hassle, but it's not your only option for these types of cruises.

Santa Fe Springs Chapter

The Masters of Harmony Perform a Unique Trilogy of Christmas Shows

Christmas Concert #1 (La Mirada) – November 30, 2019

For the first time in twenty years, the **Masters of Harmony** returned to the La Mirada Performing Arts Theater and joined the **Harborlites Chorus** for a reprise of several very successful joint concerts there in the 90s. The chorus songs included "Mary, Did You Know?" plus the ever-popular "Please Come Home for Christmas" featuring Les Weiser's solo accompanied by his saxophone and harmonica, and a new traditional Hanukkah song, "Maoz Tzur," arranged by Grant Goldstein. The Harborlites repertoire included "We Need a Little Christmas," "The Secret of Christmas," and "O Holy Night." Guest quartets included The Newfangled Four (Joey Buss, Jackson Niebrugge, Jake Tickner, Ryan Wisniewski) and from the Harborlites, Dragonfly (Carol Krenek, Amber Carroll, Catherine Berriz, Jennifer Philbin). Interspersed throughout the program were the delightful holiday songs of the Jessica Ragsdale Trio (Jessica Ragsdale, Dylann Asa, Mina Choi). The combined choruses sang "My Christmas Wish for You," "Go Tell It On the Mountain" and the "Hallelujah Chorus" with such gusto that the audience likely hoped it would not be another twenty years before these choruses shared the same stage!

Christmas Concert #2 (Cardiff-By-The-Sea) – December 14, 2019

Thanks to the efforts of Tim Truesdell, the Masters were granted the opportunity to perform at Saints Constantine and Helen Greek Orthodox Church for the first time. Joining the Masters for this historic appearance was La Jolla's Pacific Harmony Chorus. Just as in La Mirada, the show opener "Gloria" produced a high level of audience appreciation that continued unabated to the finale. Among the Pacific Coast Harmony selections were "White Christmas" and "Mary Had a Baby." The highly enthusiastic audience reception led the parish council president to suggest that this appearance by the Masters be made an annual event!

Christmas Concert #3 (Jurupa Hills High School) - December 15, 2019

The Masters show in this 400-seat auditorium marked the first-time performers were able to utilize its recently upgraded state-of-the-art audio and lighting system. The guest stars were 23 members from the high school's award-winning drama program, Players of the Palace, expertly coached by James and Molly Griffen. To a rapt audience of largely of family members, the young students performed four songs from their recent musical, Elf, and joined the Masters for the show finale.

Santa Fe Springs Christmas Tree Lighting and Christmas Float Program

Over the years, the Masters of Harmony have honored the generosity of Santa Fe Springs for making its Town Center Hall available for chorus rehearsals and storage of chorus equipment. One event is to perform a mini-concert on the evening of the lighting of decorations on a huge Christmas tree. This year, that was done on December 7 under the direction of Interim Director Alan Gordon. The other program involves providing quartets to sing on a float to entertain children and their parents awaiting the arrival of a float carrying Mr. and Mrs. Claus and a contingent of comely elves. Some of the quartets performing were chapter foursomes such as Top Notch (Bob Heron, Dan Place, Larry Goodfriend, Art Taylor) and Six Feet Off Bass (Eric Emmons, Leonard Jensen, Mark Travis, Willie Daw). Other foursome combinations made performance debuts on the float. The program is so much fun that some participants sing on more than one night and some quartets have been participating for over a decade!

Casting Call/Guest Night

On January 15, 2020, after tireless organizing work led by Mark Travis, the Masters held a casting call/guest night designed to bring in new members and encourage former members to return. Thirty-six such guests filled the risers for an introduction to the Masters of Harmony way of singing. Dr. Chris Peterson first took the assemblage through warm-ups. Director Gordon then led the group through some of the new MOH repertoire, including portions of one of the contest songs for the upcoming 2020 International in Los Angeles. After rehearsal, about 45 went to nearby Maggie's Pub for food and more singing.

Annual Awards and Installation of Officers Banquet

Members of the Masters family gathered at the Yorba Linda Country Club to install the incoming Board of Directors. Gary Stone, resplendent in his white dinner jacket a la Captain Stubing of Love Boat, kept the evening's activities going smoothly. Keynote Speaker Gary Steinkamp pointed out that the MOH is truly unique in the world of Barbershop – winners of nine world championships under four different directors! President Joe D'Amore reminded the audience that the daunting task of hosting the 2020 International Convention while competing to win is possible to dreamers willing to do what it takes to make their dreams reality. Director Gordon urged us to approach the tasks ahead of us with a sense of urgency bordering on foolishness to those who don't share our vision and our passion. The Jeff Baker Award (Quartet of the Year) was presented to Six Feet Off Bass. Justin McQueen won the Larry Ajer Performance award. Mark Travis received the Doug Maddox Master of Harmony Award (Barbershopper of the Year), an acknowledgment of the tremendous work he did to make the chorus trip to Russia such a success and for his work organizing the highly successful Casting Call/Guest Nights.

New Members of Chapter Eternal

During the past year, the Masters bade a sad farewell to four members as they joined the ranks of the Chapter Eternal: Dave Briner, John Rambo, Rob Ransom, and Lou Tedesco.

Since the last issue of Westunes, Spencer Randell was welcomed into membership.



Masters of Harmony Partners with City of Hope

In late 2019, the Masters of Harmony established a partnership with City of Hope, a leading cancer and diabetes research and treatment facility in Southern California. The Masters committed a portion of the proceeds from their November 30th Christmas Show to be donated to City of Hope in support of their outstanding work in patient cancer treatment.

Here, Masters of Harmony President Joe D'Amore and representatives of the chorus present their donation to Kevin Kate McQuhae, Senior Director of Development in City of Hope's Office of Philanthropy.

We anticipate that this will be just the beginning of a long and mutually beneficial relationship between the Masters of Harmony and City of Hope.



Lloyd Steinkamp Endowment Fund **Year-End Update**

I am writing to bring you up to date on the status of the Lloyd Steinkamp Endowment Fund for the Far Western District Harmony Camps, hereafter referred to as the LSEF that is held locally with the Sacramento Region Community Foundation, the SRCF.

The LSEF was established in the spring of 2015 by resolution of the FWD Board of Directors with the goal of growing the fund to a size large enough to provide financial support for the NorCal Harmony Camp and establish additional weekend long Harmony Camps within the FWD.

As of December 31, 2019, the LSEF has a balance of \$130,708.62 and as noted in the year end letter from the SRCF the "Endowed investment returns for 2019 topped 17% and continue to meet or exceed long term benchmarks for the last 3, 5, 7, and 10 years." In fact, the \$15,866 total net return on investments credited to our LSEF represents a return in excess of 19%!

In growing the LSEF we have been blessed with a donor who provided a double match in 2017 and 2018 for all donations up to \$400. In 2019, we were blessed with another donor who matched donations up to \$5,000. During calendar year 2019 the Fund received donations from 21 individuals.

Our fundraising GOAL for 2020 is to reach our primary level of \$200,000 at which time we will begin to withdraw a portion of the fund in accordance with the policies of the SRCF to help fund Harmony Camp. The policies of the SRCF are set up to guarantee that all of the SRCF funds grow over the years.

On a personal level, I am always challenged to think of my "WHY" for Harmony Camp. And yes, it does continue to evolve. Harmony Camp provides a path forward for so many boys who have attended, boys who may be challenged economically, who may live in single parent families, or who may not have a focus in their lives. At camp our volunteers provide a positive male role model for life, one that many of the boys have never experienced. More globally, Harmony Camp uses the unifying nature of music to "reach" these boys, so many of whom are "drifting", and looking for something to move them. Some of them find it with barbershop music without even realizing that they were looking.

Retire? Me?

Anyone who has fifty plus years singing barbershop is probably approaching or perhaps has already passed the age of retirement. Well, let me join the chorus of voices who disabuse you of retiring. It's not all it's made out to be, and I haven't even retired yet.

A common topic of conversation among those over sixty is retirement. When are you retiring? Have you decided? What will you do? That last question captures the real essence of it all. If you have nothing to do, what will retirement be like? You can't just hang around the house. If you're married, very quickly your spouse will let you know you aren't wanted. Oh, you're still tolerated—even loved—but twenty-four hours a day and seven days a week? Not on your tintype, buster. You have to get out of the house. Leisure is an attractive way to spend time, but only if you have other pressing needs. As an occupation, leisure is a sure route to either insanity or death. Nobody can do nothing for twenty-fours a day, and that you must face.

Maybe, like me, you like your work, you find it invigorating and challenging, and you're paid well. You're respected by your peers, and you do not fault on your responsibilities. Perhaps you agree with Isaac Asimov's statement about Michel Eugene Chevreul (1786-1889): "He was one of those fortunates who live into extreme old age without every living long enough to retire" (Asimov's Biographical Encyclopedia of Science and Technology). You want to continue doing whatever you're good at without ever leaving it. Thus, retirement may not be for you.

If it is, however, if you really do intend to retire, you must prepare yourself. You can't just walk away from a lifetime of work or commitment to nothing. I imagine this should be easier for you as a barbershopper because you already have this hobby or avocation called singing. Every chapter needs people like you. The president of the chapter could use you on a committee; does your chapter have a historian? Have you ever been show chairman, or secretary, or treasurer? Each one of those jobs requires full application of your talents.

Maybe the chapter doesn't need you. Then you ought to consider volunteering. This can be at a school, church, or civic organization. In Phoenix Duet will accept nearly anyone to drive home-bound "neighbors" to medical appointments, to do grocery shopping, to do handyman chores, to open and read mail, to pay bills, or to help figure out income tax. Zoos and museums need docents on a regular basis.

This could be the time in your life to polish your woodworking skills, to expand your painting horizon, to write that book you've been thinking about, to build onto your home. There are experts in nearly every field at the local community college or university who will willingly help you. Have you admired the media "biographical" presentations at funerals? You could teach yourself to do that, too.

Retirement should not spell the end of your life. But unless you have some reason to get out of bed in the morning, you may be paving your way to death. Too many people die after they discover that retirement is a short trip to a dead end. Don't let this happen to you. Get involved and stay involved.

Bill was born in February 1948 to parents Joe and Peg Rosica. During his formative years, Bill was exposed to different types of music. In 1968, while attending Bakersfield College, Bill went to see a group of singers called, "Up with People". The singing bug had bitten him, and he soon joined a local group of "Up with People-Singout Bakersfield". His brother Mike would soon join playing drums.


After getting married, starting a family and graduating from college, Bill received a phone call from a local Barbershopper, asking why he had never joined. His response was, "No one ever asked me". Well with a little encouragement he joined the Bakersfield Chapter of Barbershoppers and has been a member ever since.

Life changes in January of 1998 led Bill and a few others to make the 136-mile drive from Bakersfield to Santa Fe Springs to audition for the Masters of Harmony. Bill joined MOH just in time to compete in a Divisional contest in May of 1998. In October of that same year, he competed in Phoenix and had his first District Championship pin. Nine months later, in Anaheim, Bill would join 130 of his closest friends to win his first International Chorus Championship with MOH. He went on to serve on the Board of Directors as President and win five more gold medals a silver and a bronze.

Bill served on the District Board for 12 years under 5 different presidents, Bob Lally, Bernard Priceman, Russ Young, Gordon Bergthold (Mongo) and Craig Hughes. 10 of those years were as Division Vice-President and the last two as Executive Vice-President. Bill also served as the 2009 International Convention Chairman, in Anaheim.

Bill and his wife Mary, continue to live in Bakersfield, California with their Calico cat, Sabrina. They enjoy photography, music and going to Outback Steakhouse from time to time. Mary's encouragement has been a key to Bill's successes, both as a singer and an individual. While Mary is not interested in sports, Bill is an avid Notre Dame, San Francisco Giants and 49er's fan.

Don't be surprised if you see the District think more outside the box under Bill leadership, as Bill has been known as the "Idea-Man" in both his Chapters. Two examples are bringing VM to Bakersfield a few years back and the current "Contest at Sea" for this October.

Hello to all

It gives me great pleasure to be writing to all of our Far Western District members as your new Executive Vice President! Who would have thought back in the 1970s that a young 20-year-old music major at Occidental College would become EVP of the greatest District of the Barbershop Harmony Society? For those of you who don't know how I got into the Barbershop Harmony Society (SPEBSQSA), I'd like to take this first article to share how Barbershop found me!

The Occidental Glee Clubs had always been one of the finest College Choirs in the nation. I was lucky to be

chosen to be a member of that amazing choir in my freshman year, and needless to say, I was in awe of the voices of the upper classmen. One Saturday we had a morning rehearsal followed by a picnic at Griffith Park. After our lunch, there was a talent show. One of the best acts of the day was a Barbershop Quartet of Juniors and Seniors.

Fast forward to my Junior year in the fall of 1972. My best friend, Peter Beers and I found two other guys and we put together the "Glee Clubs Barbershop Quartet." However, this time, the Quartet actually rehearsed and learned more than one song. In fact, we started having mid-quarter, mid-week concerts in the Occidental Chapel. We actually had standing room only for those concerts. One of our classmates invited his dad to see us sing at one of those concerts. His dad's name was Jack Kelly. Little did we know that Jack was one of the most sought-after, and funniest MCs in our District, and the Society. Jack took us to a Crescenta Valley Chapter meeting, and we were blown away. We couldn't believe that there was a "Chapter of Barbershop Singers," let alone an "International Society of Barbershop Singers," in existence. He also said we needed to compete! And the competition was in a month! Our response was, "WHAT?

Well, unfortunately the Crescenta Valley Chapter had a rule that new members were required to come to six Chapter meetings before they could become members of the Chapter. That timing would not allow us to compete. But the South Bay Chapter didn't have that rule. So, Mike Senter, (a prolific arranger and Bass of our 1972 International Champion Quartet, "The Golden Staters") invited us to a "sing-out" at a mall in the South Bay where we sang for the public, and at the same time, we sang for our induction into the South Bay Chapter! The Chapter officers had a meeting right after our performance and inducted us into their Chapter (and the Society), as members of the South Bay Chapter.

While Mike taught The Occidentals how to compete, Earl Moon taught us how to be "Barbershoppers!" He taught us that Barbershopping was not just competing! He told us to find out how each of us could help the District. And we did: three of us became Directors of Chapters in our District. I directed the South Bay Chapter (without, and with my wife, Gerry) and the Whittier Chapter (both with, and without, Earl Moon). Peter Beers directed the Crescenta Valley Chapter. And Russ Walker directed the Ventura Chapter. I have always been proud of how "The Occidentals" gave back to the District that taught us what Barbershopping was really about!

So, my message to you is, "give back!" Give back to your Chapter by helping in any way you can. Give back by finding out what your Chapter needs, and volunteer. I guarantee that your Chapter has many jobs that still need to get done, or offices that need to be filled. Be a Chapter member that fills that job or even steps up to be a leader. 
Spring is almost here, and we all know what that means...shows! There are numerous Barbershop shows going on in the Arizona division in the next couple of months:

Demystifying email list "rocket science"

In previous issues we've talked about email lists and how important they are to our marketing plan. We've talked about email list services such as MailChimp that can jump start your email campaign. We've talked about ways to write an email that people will always open. Our next challenge is getting those emails delivered successfully.

What's that? You just press "Send" and it gets delivered, right?

In theory, yes, and that's how it was back in the "old days", but unfortunately there are numerous hurdles behind the scenes that make it more complicated in today's world. Simply put, things used to be a simple as a backyard barbecue, but along came SPAM, Phishing, Malware and the like to wet on our charcoal. In response to this, many internet providers, email services, and email programs have incorporated filters and other mechanisms to block this type of traffic in degrees ranging from moderate to paranoid. Unfortunately, many legitimate email senders - including us - have

been caught up in this dilemma, and our mail gets stopped before it even arrives at the sender.

It's all about REPUTATION. When your mailing list is old and contains increasingly more bad addresses, when recipients report your email as SPAM, and when you don't utilize the prevailing authentication mechanisms, you sender address or even your entire domain can get blacklisted. AOL, Yahoo, and MSN/Hotmail tend to be very "trigger happy" when it comes to blacklisting and dealing with them to get it removed is the email equivalent of root canal.

So how can you avoid this? Here are some things you can do. (If these terms are too technical, they are explained in more detail at the web page I will share with you later in this.)

List Subscription – work with your webmaster to make sure these set up correctly on your web site:

- **OPT-IN** for your mailing lists, meaning allow people to subscribe themselves.
- Use reCAPTCHA on your subscription form to prevents "bots" from subscribing.
- **Double opt-in** confirmation for your subscriptions.
- An API service to verify the email addresses during subscription

These apply whether you are hosting your own email list or using a third party such as MailChimp.

Mail Authentication – have your webmaster work with your web hosting provider to make sure these are properly set up:

- **SPF** (Sender Policy Framework) authentication
- **DKIM** (Domain Keys Identified Mail) authentication
- **DMARC** (Domain-based Message Authentication, Reporting & Conformance) Authentication
- PTR records (reverse DNS lookups) for sending your IPs
- Make sure your **MX record** is set up properly

These would apply when you are hosting your own email list server, or you are using a third-party service that sends mail using your domain name.

Things you can do yourself, and would apply in all cases.

- Do not buy or rent lists. Take the time to build your own from people who WANT to receive your mail.
- Clean your email list regularly this is something you should do at least once a year. There are a number of services that will do this for you. The one I prefer is zerobounce.net
- Make sure your domain/IPs are not on any blacklists. There are a number of services to assist vou with this.

If you find yourself having been blacklisted, there are free and paid whitelisting services. It may take some effort, and will require a lot of patience and persistence, but it can be resolved.

Further reading: I highly recommend "The Guide to Email Deliverability". It explains things very well and is a good resource for learning more about this topic.


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Central Arizona Quartet Chapter by Bill Kane
