

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Harmony Camp 202 Darn!

I am having serious Harmony Camp withdrawal as we head into the second year of HC cancellation due to the COVID. Yes, potentially Harmony Camp Lite is still on the table for spring 2022, but these Covid restrictions are "wearing". Hopefully the COVID will give us a break and we can resume what is one of the most exciting events in the Northern California Barbershop world. Truth be told, we may have dodged a bullet in 2021 as camp was to be held the weekend we received 6+ inches of rain here in the foothills!

All of this has caused me to do some serious reminiscing and recall many of the wonderful memories of Harmony Camp down through the years. First, when we relocated to Sly Park from the Santa Cruz Mountains in 2003, I remember that year vividly as we were scared to death. Could we really pull this off? Would our proposed manner of funding camp really work? How many boys would attend?

There were many of us with tears in our eyes as camp 2003 ended with nearly 100 young men on the risers for our "Friends and Family Show". That first year we undertook the challenge presented by John Krizek and Lawrence Stern to film a documentary of Camp life for use in talking with schools in the future. I still have some copies if any would like to see HC 2003 - including a very young Cory Hunt.

The excitement of having the boys arrive on Friday afternoon and the arrival of our riser crew bringing the risers and setting them up in the gym, the thrill of having our teaching quartet arrive, and the overall thrill of all singing on the porch - campers, volunteers, and clinicians.

One of the important aspects of camp is the nightly ice cream and I fondly remember the dash from picking up four three-gallon containers of ice cream from our vendor in Sacramento and racing up the hill to Sly Park before the ice cream melted. And our long-term tradition of using the leftover ice cream on our Sunday morning pancakes

Ron Black and Gary Bolles, our first Dean, were instrumental in setting the tone for Harmony Camp as primarily an educational weekend rather than just a focus on the Sunday Show. They both were always very proud of that fact and it remains the signature feature of the FWD Harmony Camp that is entirely different from all other Camps around the country.

But then Gary moved to Las Vegas and New Zealand and the charismatic Gabe Caretto assumed the role of Dean in 2012. Our current clinicians are Dean Gabe Caretto; Chris Lewis, who first attended camp as the

bass of our teaching quartet, Brannigan; Ron Black who began his career with Harmony Camp in Southern California; and Bruce Sellnow who "grew up" with Harmony Camp since the Santa Cruz Mountain days and finally stepped into the role of Clinician just a couple of years ago. Bruce has always been our "go-to" guy to solve those inevitable last-minute problems.

The King Fire in 2014 was a challenge for us. I remember standing in the living room of my house on Friday morning with Joe Cerutti, our invited clinician from BHS, looking out at the smoke from the fire that even enveloped our house in Placerville struggling to make the decision to cancel Harmony Camp. The wind had shifted overnight and covered not only Sly Park, where we hold Camp, but even as far west as my home in Placerville. It was clearly too smoky to hold Camp.

However, unbeknownst to me, two of the boys contacted their music teacher who called and offered Ponderosa High School as an alternative for Saturday. Abut 25 boys were able to join us at Ponderosa for a simply glorious day of "Harmony Camp Lite".

I recall another year when the camp weekend coincided with honors choir auditions in Sacramento so my right-hand person, Patsy, drove four boys to their auditions Saturday morning.

And then there was the year Sly Park forgot to let us know that the gym where the chorus rehearses was being renovated and was simply not useable. What to do? Well, with many trips to Sly Park the week before camp we figured out that the cafeteria would be fine as our rehearsal space. While a bit challenging, it turned out just fine with the humor of Storm Front, our teaching quartet for the weekend, and the fact that this was the year that it rained most of the weekend.

With our long history of watching boys grow up during and after their weekends at Harmony Camp, we often recognize and say that "Music changes lives" and we can never know how many young men have had their lives enriched through their weekend of Barbershop Harmony at Camp. One young man who attended camp for four years is Dan Rohovit. You may have read some of the activities Dan is involved with as a music educator in Texas and through his work as an intern at BHS.

Another young man came as a member of a quartet in Milpitas and now works with Audacity Performing Arts Project in the San Jose area. And I am fairly certain we are all familiar with Jason Dyer and the Dyer family: father Jim, Jason, Brandon and Brock, all of whom have been part of Harmony Camp in one way or another down through the years.

Several years ago, we had a mother contact us regard-

ing her autistic son attending camp. After many phone conversations, we agreed that she would also spend the weekend at camp as he was prone to wander. That first year went well and each of the four years after (without mother needing to attend). This young man is now working and composing music. Every so often I get some new music from him. I harbor a distinct pride that Harmony Camp had an important role in his development.

Lastly there is the young man from Reno who would admit himself that he was somewhat wild in those early years. However, he loved barbershop, but as a camper he challenged us. We learned recently that he has completed his degree and is now teaching music in elementary school. He came back to camp recently as a volunteer. However, the wonderful part of his story is that he volunteered to be the personal chaperone of a disabled young man in a wheelchair who joined us at camp. This young man also loved barbershop and was able to participate in the weekend thanks to his chaperone.

One of our resident tag masters for the boys down through the years has been Les Cudworth. The boys love to sing with Les and each year we hear the chant "Les Is More". I can assure you, Les loves it and has a very special "way" with the boys.

One last memory - The Really Big Quartet was the name of a youth chorus that we put together from mostly Harmony Camp boys. It was for the traditional Midwinter Barbershop Convention. However, most of my memories still revolve around the Looong bus ride from Sacramento to Las Vegas with some forty young men to compete at the convention. What a weekend!

One more memory that remains near the top. We have only ever sent one boy home for cause. The boy had been fighting and when confronted, he took a swing at our security guy. He was immediately sent home. The truly astounding thing about this seemingly insignificant thing is that to this day, the young man himself credits this event as a turning point in his life. He soon went into the armed services and came out to a job and a family and is the pride of his mom and dad!!

All these memories are possible through the generosity and volunteer activities of so many of you. There are a couple of very special volunteers that I want to mention because without them camp would not be possible. Don Franklin has served as our security person and in this role he does just about everything, including the late-night head counts. Our kitchen guru is Bill Faulkner. He keeps the volunteer kitchen crew organized, interfaces with the Sly Park kitchen staff and

makes certain our ice cream is ready when the talent show ends.

This special weekend is made possible through the generosity of barbershop members and chapters like you. You should be proud and honored for your long history of continued support for the Far Western District Harmony Camp.

Thank you and please join us in 2022 for our Friends and Family Show.

LLOYD STEINKAMP ENDOWMENT FUND FOR **FWD HARMONY CAMP**

The Steinkamp endowment fund was started in June of 2015 with some of the residual funds from Harmony Camp donors that had not been spent directly on Camp.

Those funds, along with contributions over these past six short years, have grown to near to our initial target of 200 K. The fund today stands at a value of \$179,735.

I have been privately projecting that the fund will surpass our 200 K target some time in the first quarter of next year. It sure would be nice, however, if the fund were to exceed that goal by the end of this year (smile). And to that end, while I was writing this note, I got an email from the Foundation holding the Steinkamp Fund that we received a donation of \$2,000!!! Whooopeee, we're on our way!!!

The fund did take a bit of a hit in the third guarter of 2021 with the downturn of the stock market, but it looks like the fourth quarter may provide a nice rebound. That still probably won't be enough to get us over the target goal by itself. But if we were to get a surprising number of end-of-year contributions to the fund, we just might make it...

What a wonderful gift that would be for Harmony Camp 2022. It won't pay for the entire Camp but would certainly decrease the amount of fund raising needed to run the camp.

While I don't mean to be actively soliciting, I guess I really am. So, please help us get this done so that future Harmony Camps will have a significant portion of the cost paid for out of all your past donations!!

The Masters of Harmony Unveil A Bold New Plan for Musical Excellence

Rethinking Choral Singing during the COVID Era

On March 10, 2020, 60 members of the Skagit Valley Chorale of Mt. Vernon, Washington attended a 2.5-hour rehearsal unaware that a member who felt ill was carrying COVID-19. In the days that followed, 52 of the 60 attendees became ill, two would die, and tests confirmed the presence of covid. Developments like this made some choral groups cease operations at least temporarily. However, in time, groups like the **Masters of Harmony** began to find workarounds such as Internet Zoom meetings and the use of JackTrip equipment to make online rehearsals as realistic as possible. Gradually, groups like the MOH have returned to in-person rehearsals using masks following current government requirements. While choral singers are eager to rehearse safely and once again entertain live audiences, groups like MOH must adapt to the changing conditions and even rethink their mission statements.

The Masters of Harmony Unveil a New Vision Statement

Throughout its 35-year history, the Masters of Harmony motto has been "Dedicated to Musical Excellence" and that dedication has resulted in nine international chorus championships. However, despite being located in the middle of a metropolitan area of 19 million people, MOH is sometimes considered one of Southern California's "Best Kept Secrets. Its success has been achieved mostly in a "Barbershop Bubble" of about 30,000 and it is largely unknown to the larger entertainment world. In the 2020 Virtual Midwinter Convention, Keynote Speaker Kevin Keller encouraged attendees to consider "What if" thinking. Under the leadership of Joe D'Amore, the MOH Board took up the challenge and produced the following 2021-2025 Vision Statement:

"The Masters of Harmony is an entertaining and dynamic vocal ensemble recognized by a broad, worldwide audience for its award-winning performances."

Some of the noteworthy goals laid out in the chapter's 4-year strategic plan are as follows:

- Achieve greater name and performance recogni tion in the LA Metropolitan area.
- Seek performance opportunities for smaller MOH groups to perform in places unsuitable for the en tire chorus, perhaps in combination with groups from other genres.
- Find experienced male singers from other musical genres willing to give MOH a try.
- Collaborate and perform with other choruses and singing groups in our local area.
- Reach out to diversified cultural communities who may be unfamiliar with our type of music.
- Align us with the music industry for commercial gigs that bring exposure to the public.
- Become more involved with events and celebra tions in our local communities.
- Modernize and enhance our show performances so that they become "must-see" events.

The Masters of Harmony Join the La Mirada Chamber of Commerce

One part of the new Vision Plan was achieved when the Greater Los Angeles Chapter became a member of the La Mirada Chamber of Commerce, a way to build relationships in our new home city. In a recent meeting of the Chamber, Larry Icenogle, Mark Travis, Eric Emmons, and Bart Halberstadt sang The Star-Spangled Banner and two polecats to La Mirada Mayor Ed Eng and our new fellow Chamber members. The meeting generated two invitations for the MOH or a chapter quartet to sing at upcoming civic events in La Mirada.In addition, our chapter quartet Soundwave (Adam Marangakis, Tom Moore, Peter Trist, Joe D'Amore) will be performing and representing the MOH at the city's "Salute to Veterans" at the La Mirada Theater for the Performing Arts on November 8.

The Masters of Harmony Return to Live Performance

On December 11, 2021, the Masters of Harmony will join the Pacific Coast Harmony chorus again for a joint performance at the Saints Constantine and Helen Greek Orthodox Church in Cardiff, California, a church building known for incredible acoustic quality that envelops the audience with vibrant sound. Due to COVID regulations, two volunteers will be checking for vaccination records or negative COVID tests. Usage of masks by the audience is encouraged but not required.

The Dan Place Memorial Fund

Several months ago, the Masters of Harmony family was deeply saddened by the loss of **Dan Place**, a man much beloved within the chorus, his Church of the Good Shepherd congregation, and his Arcadia community. Dan loved his MOH family and in his 32 years as a member, he never missed a performance. His family has created The Dan Place Memorial Fund as part of our Masters Circle donation program. This is an unrestricted fund that can be used to support a wide variety of MOH activities. The Place family has agreed to match any donations made for the remainder of 2021 up to \$10,000. 

Remembering Joe Salz

After I joined the Phoenicians Chorus in 1971, I was placed on the risers in the back row next to Joe Salz. Joe was a smooth singer who, singing in The Desert Knights, had won the Far Western District quartet championship in 1957. At one of the chorus rehearsals I got to hear the Stage Four quartet sing and was duly impressed by them. I wasn't surprised when later they won the quartet competition in 1972 and later qualified to compete at the international contest.

Joe touched my life most directly in 1975 when he invited me to sing in a quartet he was forming to be called Nostalgia. It was Joe's intention to take advantage of all the focus on nostalgia to name the quartet Nostalgia. Of course, he was to be the lead. With Bill Adank as tenor, Gordon Bergthold as bass, and me as baritone, we became a quartet. As I recall we were not intensive in our rehearsals; we enjoyed singing together and joked about as much as we sang. In 1976 we placed 8th at the International Pre-lims.

Gordon's parents--Ginger and Elwood--were celebrating their 40th wedding anniversary, in 1976 and Gordon proposed that Nostalgia sing for them in San Jose. We left Phoenix around noon on Friday with Gordon driving the company car, a Ford LTD which transported us comfortably except there were no facilities for relieving bladder pressure which Joe complained of. At the time I was drinking milk, so an empty pint milk

carton became a handy receptacle to relieve Joe's distress.

We arrived in San Jose early Saturday morning. During the afternoon, we entertained the celebrants by performing the Phoenicians' Bi-Centennial program for everyone.

The drive back to Phoenix took all day Sunday. I believe we stopped for dinner at the San Gorgonio Inn in Banning.

Nostalgia placed 8th in the FWD quartet contest in the fall of 1976 at Sacramento.


When Joe accepted a position as manager of a credit union in Sacramento, we recruited Bob Kafer to sing as baritone and I moved up to sing lead. Joe got us to sing on the Sacramento barbershop show which allowed the original four to re-unite. Bill embossed a pint milk container to present to Joe with the inscription: "Joe Salz: Gone but not forgotten."

Over the years I observed Joe serving as the FWD Treasurer which job he performed quite well, so it was no surprise that he was named to the FWD Hall of Fame in 2002. (By the way, Gordon Bergthold was also elected to the Hall of Fame in 2019).

The last time I saw Joe was at the Phoenix Chapter's annual show in 2019, He was using a walker, but he still displayed that beaming smile and warm personality I had grown accustomed to.

In the annals of barbershop, Joe Salz is certain to be regarded as one of the giants. He was an excellent singer, a doting father, a loving husband, and a good friend. I'm sure I'm not the only one who remembers him fondly.


All is quiet on the Southwestern front...

Quartetting

Well, I've been noticing what seems to be a trend in our hobby of late. Simply put, requests for Quartets are in demand.

Over the past dozen years or so since I was able to get back involved in Barbershop singing, one of my responsibilities while singing with the Golden Valley Chorus (GVC) of the Central California Chapter, was coordinating Quartets when called upon. We, as a Chorus, don't receive many requests for a Quartet. I don't sing in a Quartet, and only one or two guys in the Chorus do. And those are not Quartets from our Chorus exclusively. Most of our singers are not very interested in Quartetting, even when we do tags during rehearsal. So, when a call comes in for a Quartet, I have to determine who might be willing, able, and available.

Since many of our Choruses are not scheduling performances and shows just yet, what with waiting to see what happens during this next phase of COVID, folks still want to hear our brand of music. There has been an uptick in requests for Quartets which is great news. However, not having Quartets readily on hand, presents its own set of challenges. Cobbling Quartets together for a gig, often using guys who have never sung together before, adds to the difficulty of presenting a quality sound, and, ultimately, the overall presentation.


What I'm trying to say in this article is that Quartetting is at the heart and soul of our hobby. One of the best ways to break into Quartetting is to learn your music cold. The Pole Cat songs are a great place to start because you should already be familiar with them. As you do that, see if your Chapter has a program where you can earn your Pole Cat Pin. The Society has had this program in place for as long as I've been in Barbershopping which goes back to 1988. This helps you become familiar with singing with a Quartet, and it allows you to work past the jitters. I know for me, I ran out of air trying to complete a song the first time I sang with a Quartet for competition. So, I zeroed in on my

breath control which helped my overall confidence in Quartetting.

Another factor in Quartetting is singing your part while hearing the other three parts without becoming distracted. Also, hearing the other three parts helps you to enjoy the song and its harmony. When you sing in a Chorus, particularly the large and medium sized Choruses, but also in small Choruses, you can find yourself standing next to those who are singing the same part as you. The downside of that is two-fold: 1. You become too relaxed in the comfort of those around you, and 2. You lose the urgency to know your part in every

So, with Choruses still trying to find their way through this next phase of the pandemic morass, now would be a great time to hone those Quartetting skills. You never know! Perhaps you'll have someone in your Chorus like me, needing to assemble a Quartet for an upcoming gig.

Over the course of the past 1 ½ years, there has been nothing new to report about YIH due to the pandemic. Well, as of this past October, that has changed.

As I have asked for ideas of what we could do for our youth in the FWD, a few of you have replied with some great ideas. Thank you for your input and please keep the ideas coming. Remember that ALL ideas will be entertained!!

In Northern California, we have seen the cancellation of the Boy's Harmony Camp that is directed by Richard Lund once again. Throughout the Far Western District we have also seen the cancellation of all Divisional and Preliminary Contests in 2021 as well as the Fall District Contest. As we looked for a way to still connect with the youth in our District, the FWD Youth in Harmony partnered with the SCVA, HFI and the AIC to bring a historic Youth Outreach Event to Southern California. The idea was simple; find a willing International Champion Quartet to appear at an equally willing school to engage with some of our youth. Southern California was chosen due to past success of other youth programs. We chose the dates of October 28 and 29 and let Tim Broersma and Dennis Castiglione go to work.

To our surprise, we found five Quartets and 18 schools who were willing to commit. Through the hard work of Antone Rodich with the Southern California Vocal Association (SCVA), Jim Clark and Dennis Castiglione with the Harmony Foundation International (HFI), Tim Broersma and Rob Menaker with the Association of International Champions (AIC), and a host of others, we were able to visit 18 schools in just two days! We estimated that we reached well over 1500 students in the five counties of L.A., Orange, San Diego, San Bernardino and Riverside.

We were able to acquire Crossroads (BHS 2009 International Champions), Class Ring (SAI 2019 International Champions), Forefront (BHS 2016 International Champions), Lovenotes (SAI 2014 International Champions) and Ripple Effect (World Mixed Quartet 3rd Place Bronze Medalists) for this endeavor. HFI, through the magical work of Tim Broersma, was to sponsor the event with a contribution from the FWD.

The results were beyond anyone's wildest dream!! Each school was shown how 4-part harmony works which was demonstrated by their assigned Quartet and explained by a clinician who accompanied the Quartet. The clinicians were Jim Clark (HFI, BHS, AIC), Debbie Cleveland (SAI), Kim Vaughn (SAI), Royce Ferguson (Revival - FWD 1998 International Quartet Champion) and Steve Armstrong (BHS Chair of Judging Committee). The kids were then taught a tag or two as a group and then sang the tag in a Quartet. The students were so excited that some of them wanted to sing more than once!! The students were then entertained further by a performance of a song or two by their respective Quartet. Educating our youth and exposing them to 4-part harmony was the main goal and the reception from the teachers and students showed us that we were more than successful in our venture...their response was UNBELIEVABLE! Portola High School in Irvine, CA, was so excited that they went and learned the tag, "Sleepy Time," on their own, after we left and then sent a recording to us as a gesture of thanks and appreciation!! How cool was that?!?

And the excitement didn't end with just the students. All five of the Quartets who participated were just as excited as the kids! Having a chance to "debrief" the Quartets, all were honored to have been asked to participate in this event and seemed to be exhilarated to have been there for the students. To see the excitement in the faces of these World Champions as they interacted with, and later talked about the students was unbelievably priceless!!!

Special thanks to Craig Ewing, Mike Lawton, Michael Schoonhoven, Royce Ferguson and Bart Halberstadt. These guys were responsible for fighting traffic in the am, getting to various schools during the day and then fighting traffic to get the Quartets back to "base camp" at night to get them prepared for the next day of school visits.

Although the Association of International Champions and the Harmony Foundation International funded this entire extravaganza, Bill Rosica, your FWD President and the FWD Board of Directors, has authorized a contribution on behalf of our District to help fund this past event. Bill challenges you, the FWD, to match that amount. Our District will match your contribution of up to \$5000.00. Your donations are needed so that we may continue this important outreach to our youth. This program has turned out to be a huge success and through your generosity we can repeat this type of program to the other areas of our District.
